Britons Protest Delay in UK Iraq-War Report

LONDON (Press TV) – People have gathered outside the Westminster in London to protest against a delay in the publication of a long-awaited inquiry into their country's role in the 2003 war on Iraq, Press TV reports.

Protesters say the report's postponement is widely due to its criticism of former Prime Minister Tony Blair and his government over their involvement in the deadly US-led invasion of

"It's obvious that Tony Blair will be criticized... So, they want

to delay this as long as possible and obviously with an election... and the conservative party voted for the war... and they do really have something to hide here," said Lindsey German with Stop the War Coalition.

Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg, who is also the leader of the Liberal Democrats party, said earlier this month that the report was being "watered down," as Blair and other former officials were given the chance to respond to the inquiry's findings.

However, the inquiry's chair-

man, John Chilcot, says the wait has been caused by delays in responses from individuals.

On January 21, the British government announced that the inquiry would be published after the 2015 general elections in

The Chilcot report had previously been delayed by rows over its criticism of leading figures in Blair's government and diplomatic negotiations between the US and the UK about what can be revealed from correspondence between Blair and former US President George W. Bush.

The inquiry first started its submissions back in 2009 and concluded its gathering in 2011. It is four years overdue.

The US and Britain invaded Iraq in blatant violation of international law in 2003 over the allegation that the regime of then Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein possessed weapons of mass destruction (WMD). No WMDs, however, were ever found in Iraq.

The war left hundreds of thousands of Iraqis dead and millions

military convoy was planned to resemble the occupying regime's attack on a Hezbollah convoy 10 days earlier.

"They killed us in broad daylight, we killed them in broad daylight ... They hit two of our vehicles, we hit two of their vehicles," he

"As for the casualties, we'll have to wait and see," he added. Six Hezbollah members and an Iranian commander were martyred in the Israeli strike. The Zionist regime has acknowledged that at least two of its soldiers were killed in Hezbollah's retaliation, but many speculate the casualty toll to be higher.

The main difference between the two attacks was that Tel Aviv did not immediately acknowledge that its soldiers were targeted, while Hezbollah announced the occupying regime's attack in Qunaitra moments after the strike, he said.

Nasrallah said that threats by Zionist PM Benjamin Netanyahu against the individuals who carried out the attack in the Shebaa Farms indicates that he is evading military confrontation and is seeking to track them down to assassinate them.

But if any of Hezbollah's cadre or youth are killed, Hezbollah will respond at any place and during any time it sees fit, he added.

Zionists have discovered over the past few days that their political and military leaders are amateurs, Nasrallah added, pointing to the occupying regime's upcoming elections. The "foolishness" of this leadership has risked great dangers for Israel, he added.

He began his speech by noting that the attack on the Hezbollah convoy revealed the unity between Beirut, Damascus and Tehran.

Nasrallah said that the martyrs of the attack reflect a "fusion of Lebanese-Iranian blood on Syrian territory, and reflects the unity of the cause and the unity of the fate of these

"When blood unites Palestine, Lebanon, Syria and Iran, then we will move towards an era of victory," he added.

The martyrdom of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps Brig. Gen. Muhammad Ali Allahdadi and Hezbollah field commander Muhammad Issa shows how commanders are present on the ground along with the fighters, he added.

And the martyrdom of Jihad Mughniyeh, son of late-Hezbollah commander Imad Mughniyeh, shows how entire families have given themselves to the resistance, he added. Nasrallah extended his condolences to the families of the victims and blessed the fallen fighters for their martyrdom.

The party leader also expressed his respect for the eight Lebanese soldiers killed during fierce clashes with militants near Ras Baalbek last week, likening the Takfiri threat to the Israeli one.

Nasrallah called the Zionist regime a "cancerous growth" in the region which is cooperating with the militants in Syria, including the Al-Qaeda affiliate Al-Nura Front.

"In Syria, Israel has been backing the extremist groups and shelling regime positions under various excuses," he said, adding that the Zionist regime is "taking advantage of the divisions in the region and the complete absence of the united stances of the Arab countries"

"Thousands of members of Al-Nusra Front are present along the border with Israel in the occupied Golan Heights. Netanyahu is not at all concerned by the presence of Al-Nusra on Israel's border. Israel however felt threatened by Hezbollah members and an Iranian general passing through Quneitra," he mocked.

The motive behind the attack was clear Nasrallah said.

The occupying regime of Israel had "planned, calculated and took a premeditated decision to assassinate" the men, he added, denying claims that they were planning an attack on the Zionist regime

Nasrallah also denounced the Arab League for its lack of support to Palestine during periods of conflict, saying it has benefited the occupying regime of Israel more than the Palestinians

The 22-member league "is not absent", Nasrallah contended, "but does not exist at

The 50-day Israeli assault on Gaza during July and August, he added, points to the failure of Arab states to react to the assault which killed around 2,200 Palestinians, including more than 400 children.

President Barack Obama's administration says it is opposed to any congressional action that might scupper the ongoing landmark negotiations between international powers and Iran.

Some U.S. lawmakers insist on keeping Iran's feet to the fire by pressing ahead with a deferred sanctions bill before June 30, which would trigger a gradual escalation of economic sanctions beginning in July should talks collapse.

But in a victory for Obama, senators on Tuesday agreed to delay a full Senate vote until at least March 24 to allow international negotiators to reach a political framework agreement without congressional pressure.

In order to be ready to launch such a debate on the Senate floor after that date, the Banking Committee finalized the bill's text Thursday, a procedural requirement that served to revive the threat of new sanctions.

Currently, 35 of the Senate's 100 members officially back the bill, a figure that is expected to increase in coming months. On Tuesday, ambassadors from France,

Britain, Germany and the European Union met in Washington with Senate Democrats urging them to ease the pressure. "Let's give time to the negotiations,"

French ambassador Gerard Araud posted on Twitter, recalling that while the March 24 date was a "goal" the true deadline for an agreement remained June 30.

If Congress passes the final Kirk-Menendez bill, Obama is expected to veto it.

Saudi King Dismisses Prince Bandar

RIYADH (Dispatches) - Saudi King Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud has dismissed Prince Bandar bin Sultan from the National Security Council.

King Salman on Thursday issued a number of royal decrees that removed or changed a number of top Saudi officials.

The new king, who succeeded the late King Abdullah last week, also removed Intelligence Chief Prince Khaled bin Bandar from his post and appointed him as his advisor.

He also sacked two of the late king's sons from big jobs.

King Salman replaced Riyadh Governor Turki bin Abdullah with Faisal bin Bandar, and reinstated Khaled al-Faisal as Mecca governor less than two years after he was replaced by Mishaal bin

The new king, however, kept in place Abdullah's other son Miteb as the Minister of the National Guard.

King Salman also reshuffled a number of posts in the cabinet, while keeping unchanged the oil, foreign, finance, defense, interior, labor, transport and economy, and planning ministers.

The 79-year-old king also eliminated a dozen councils and specialized committees while creating two main bodies for security and economy affairs.

The former king died on January 23 at limited movement on his left arm and is

the age of 90 after weeks of being hospitalized with a lung infection. He had suffered frequent periods of ill health in recent years.

believed to be suffering from Alzheimer's, is taking over at a time when King Abdullah's demise is expected to fuel a power struggle within the ruling family.

His succeeding to the throne also coincides with the kingdom's grappling with dissent in the east and the region's attempting to deal with the repercussions of the terrorism funded and the extremism exported by Riyadh.

Riyadh has also turned into a butt of criticism for sending shockwaves throughout the international economy by allegedly fixing oil prices.

London Rejects Qatari Palace Construction Plans

LONDON (AP) - The Westminster Council has rejected plans by Qatar's royal family to build a lavish palace in London, said to be worth £200 million.

Matthew Rees, planning officer at Westminster city council, said on Thursday that the Qatari family's plans to build a 17-bedroom British palace had been turned

Rees said the plans had been rejected due to a shortage of homes.

"Your development would lead to the loss of a housing unit which would not meet S14 of rooms, 14 lounges, four dining Westminster's City Plan: Strate-rooms, a swimming pool, a cigar gic Policies adopted November lounge, a cinema, and a juice bar. 2013," Rees said in an official memo written to the Qatari family's agents. "Negotiation could not overcome the reasons for refusal."

Under the plan, the palace would have been built in the city of Westminster's Cornwall Ter-

It would have included 17 bed-

This comes shortly after the family purchased London's major business district, the Canary Wharf, for £2.6 billion.

The leader of the Labour group at the Conservative-controlled authority, Paul Dimoldenberg, slammed the recent trend of

Persian Gulf billionaires buving property in the United Kingdom.

"There is no need for more multimillion-pound houses. The issue isn't finding homes for the Qatar royal family or any other monarchy. We need to find homes for people on medium and low incomes," Dimoldenberg said.

The Qatari royal family also has shares in the Harrods upmarket department store and the Shard skyscraper in London.
