Iranian Taekwondo Player Wins Gold Medal in Asian Games



INCHEON (ISNA) - Iranian first day of taekwondo competitaekwondo player Mehdi Khoda-Bakhshi competing in (-80kg-category) crashed his Uzbek rival, winning a gold medal in Asian Games.

Iran has so far won 15 gold medals in 2014 Asian Games underway in Incheon, South Korea.

He also defeated his rivals from Nepal and Japan (16-0) and (5-1) and crashed another rival from Tajikistan.

Masoud Hoji-Zawareh and Sousan Haji respectively won gold and bronze medals in the tions in Incheon.

The 2014 Asian Games began in South Korea's northwestern city of Incheon on September 19, and will wrap up on October 4.

Some 9,500 athletes from 45 countries are competing at the Games. The sports event is the world's second-biggest multisport event after the summer Olympics, with 439 gold medals in 36 sports up for grabs.

Iran has participated in the tournament with 276 athletes in 22 sports.

Muslim Player Penalized for Praying

WASHINGTON (IQNA) - An American Muslim footballer has been penalized for prostrating after scoring a six-point touchdown in Kansas City Chiefs win over the New England Patriots, sparking condemnations over the unjustified penalty.

"If I get a pick, I'm going to prostrate before God in the end zone." Husain Abdullah, a devout Muslim player, told The Kansas City Star on Tuesday, September 30.

During Monday's game, the National Football League (NFL) player Abdullah received a 15-vard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty after punctuating his 39-yard interception return for a touchdown.

"It's a basic crossing route that we've probably walked through since training camp," Abdullah said.

"It was one of those things where he never saw me. He was looking at his receiver and I stole it."

The refs flagged the 29-year-old veteran for dropping to his knees after the play to prostrate to Allah, technically a violation of the league's celebration rules. Rule 12, Section 3, Article 1 (d) of the NFL rulebook states that "players are prohibited from engaging in any celebrations or demonstrations while on the ground."

However, NFL experts confirmed that going to one's knees to give praise is

exempt from that enforcement. "You're not penalized for going to the ground to give praise after a TD," former NFL referee Mike Pereira pointed out last season.

Over the past years, there have been some exceptions made for religious expressions, such as Tim Tebow's prayer while kneeling.

For Tebow, falling into his knees to perform his Christian prayer has

not been penalized, but became a highly embraced phenomenon during the 2011 season. Anger

Though Abdullah seemed to accept the decision, the penalty sparked a quick outrage on Twitter where it was noted that plenty of Christian players mark their scores with prayers.

"If the NFL tries to fine for his TD celebration there's going to be some problems," the agent, CJ LaBoy, said on Twitter late Monday night.

Offering a role-model to young Muslims, Abdullah and his brother, Hamza, who spent 2005-11 with the Arizona Cardinals, made a 30-city-in-30-day, crosscountry road trip in a minivan during the 30 days of Ramadan in July and August. They spoke and prayed at mosques and performed community service from coast-to-coast and in Canada, even while fasting during Ramadan.

After the trip, Abdullah decided not to return to the Minnesota Vikings, taking his wife, parents and two older brothers on a month-long spiritual journey to Saudi Arabia at the prime time of his career.

^uIndia Face Pakistan in Asiad Hockey Final After 32 years^u

INCHEON (DAWN) - Archrivals India and Pakistan face off in a mouth-watering field hockey final at the Asian Games on Thursday with a place in the 2016 Olympics at stake.

Millions of fans in both nations will be glued to their television screens for the title clash which earns the winner a ticket to Rio de Janeiro and the loser left facing a hazardous qualification route.

India and Pakistan last met in an Asiad final way back at New Delhi in 1982 where the Indians suffered a stunning 1-7 rout in front of their hown fans that included then Prime Minister Indira Gandhi.

In Beijing in 1990 when Paki-

stan claimed the gold and India the silver, there was no final since the winner was decided after a roundrobin league.

Eight-time Olympic champions India have won the Asiad title just twice, both in the Thai capital of Bangkok in 1966 and 1998.

In contrast, defending champions Pakistan are the most successful team in the continental games with eight golds, highlighted by four successive wins over India in a final from 1970 to 1982.

Pakistan, coached by former international Shahnaz Sheikh, start as favourites following their 2-1 win over India in the preliminary league.

But Sheikh was worried by the failure of his strikers to score against Malaysia in Tuesday's semi-final which ended in a 0-0 draw before Pakistan edged ahead 6-5 in the tie-breaker.

"We played better than them but just could not score," said Sheikh, a former striker hismelf. "We don't want to make the same mistake again.

"Fans love an India-Pakistan game. I am sure the final will be exciting.

India upset hosts South Korea 1-0 in the semi-final through Akashdeep Singh's 44th minute winner, but face a tougher test against Pakistan's goalkeeper Imran Butt, the star of the shoot-out win against Malaysia.

The Indians, coached by Australian Terry Walsh, will also bank on reliable goalie P. R. Sreejesh to block the Pakistani forwards as star midfielder and Captain Sardar Singh attempts to control the game upfront.

"The final is a very important game for our young side," said Walsh.

"There was a lot of energy shown against the Koreans but we must seize the chances that come our way.

South Korea and Malaysia will contest the bronze medal play-off ahead of the final. гb
