Importance of Mother Tongue

Well youngsters, speaking of languages, yesterday February 21 was the International Mother Language Day (IMLD). It was declared by the United Nations General Assembly in 2008, after almost a decade of being celebrated as such by the UNESCO since 1999. The day marks the anniversary of the 21 February 1952 mass demonstrations of students and staff of Dhaka University for recognition of their mother tongue, Bengali, as second official language, in what was then East Pakistan and which in 1971 became the independent country of Bangladesh – of course with the help of India's military forces.

Language reflects the culture of people who speak that tongue and through it convey to the world their thoughts, their feelings, their way of life, their traditions, and their contribution to the collective development of mankind's progress in the fields of art, architecture, science and technology. Every person is proud of his/her mother tongue, and strives to protect it from fading into oblivion, since the death of a language means the death of part of human culture and civilization.

The IMLD ceremonies are organized by UNESCO in member states. This year, the opening ceremony was held at UNESCO head-quarters in Paris, France. The theme for IMLD 2017 is "Towards Sustainable Futures through Multilingual Education."

UNESCO Director-General, Bulgaria's Irina Georgieva Bokova, considers mother languages as the identity of humans and says: "By safeguarding them we actually preserve ourselves." She said in her message on IMLD 2017: "I request that multilingual education is recognized through the executive and educational system, cultural translation, cyber space, trade and other fields."

In this regard, the UNESCO website, reads: In order to pave the way for sustainable development, students should be taught their mother language – in addition to other languages. It is through good command of the mother language that acquisition of basic skills including reading, writing and mathematics become possible. Local languages especially minority or native languages are considered the gate for transfer of cultures, values and traditional knowledge.

Today people throughout the world speak 6700 different languages. Half the number of these languages are in danger of extinction, and over the past 60 years, some 200 languages have disappeared. According to experts by the end of the 21st century, half of these languages will be no more.

A psychologist says: the mother language is the means with which a child builds its identity. It is the only and first communication means of a child with its immediate relatives, i.e. parents, siblings, grandparents, etc. The personality of every person takes shape right from child-hood through communication with closest relatives and expression or exchange of sincerity with them in the mother tongue.

The importance of mother language is further revealed by the late South African president Nelson Mandela's statement: "If you speak to a person in a language that he/she knows, your words will find way to his/her brain. But if you speak to someone in his/her mother language, it will penetrate the heart."

We in the Islamic Republic of Iran are a good example of unity in lingual diversity, since, beside our national language "Persian", which is also the national language of Afghanistan and Tajikistan, our compatriots speak Azeri, Arabic, Kurdish, Baluchi, Tukomani, Gilaki, Mazandarani, and Luri – not to speak of the world languages that Iranians have mastered such as English, French, German, Spanish, Urdu, Chinese, Japanese, Malayo, Swahili, etc.
