Hypocrisy Towards Sacrilege of Muslim Cemeteries

It seems there is no respect for the peace of the dead in Palestine, the Muslim land which continues to groan under the jackboots of

Heart-wrenching news from the occupied Islamic city of Bayt al-Mogaddas speak of the fresh bout of desecration by the spurious entity called Israel, which sent bulldozers to demolish several Muslim graves in addition to a wall at a cemetery, in total disrespect for human and religious values.

According to reports the destroyed cemetery contains the graves of some 400 Palestinian martyred during the June 1967 war. The Zionist entity plans to build a park at the site of the demolished

Pakistan, Iran Discuss **Boosting Relations**

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Iranian Foreign Minister Muhammad Javad Zarif and his Pakistani counterpart Khawaja Muhammad Asif here on Monday held talks on a range of issues, including ways to boost rela-

The two sides also exchanged views on regional issues, including the U.S. government's new strategy in Afghanistan.

Last month, U.S. President Donald Trump presented a new strategy in Afghanistan, which envisages keeping troops in the war-wracked country as long as Washington liked.

Trump also accused Islamabad of "continuing to harbor criminals and terrorists" in Afghanistan, angering

Asif's trip to Iran and other countries sends a strong message to the U.S. that Pakistan enjoys broad regional support.

The Pakistani foreign minister is on a four-nation tour which had already taken him to China. He left Iran for Turkey and plans to visit Russia next.

Asif arrived in Tehran for a oneday visit for talks with Zarif as well as Iranian President Hassan Rouhani and Vice President for Economic Affairs Mohammad Nahavandian.

Iran's Tasnim news agency said bilateral relations and the new U.S. strategy in Afghanistan were the focus of the negotiations.

In their meeting, Rouhani lambasted foreign interference in regional Pakistani diplomats have said issues, reiterating that peace and portance of cooperation of all coun-

security of the region must only be ensured by its nations.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran believes that only regional countries, particularly Iran and Pakistan, must endeavor and cooperate to establish regional security, stability and peace," he said.

Rouhani said regional issues, including the crisis in Afghanistan, should be settled through regional approaches and not by foreigners and extra-regional powers.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran is ready to cooperate with regional countries, including Pakistan, in the fight against terrorism and development of peace, stability and security in the region," Rouhani pointed out.

Iran: Saudi Accusations a Worn-Out Tactic

TEHRAN (Dispatches) - Iran on Monday hit back at Saudi Arabia for accusing Tehran of sponsoring terrorism, saying Iranophobia had turned to a worn-out tactic and was being used as a tool for political goals by certain countries in the region.

In comments on Friday, Saudi Arabia's minister of state for the Persian Gulf region Thamer al-Sabhan accused Iran and Hezbollah of being at the root of terrorism and extremism in the world and calling for global action

Iran's Foreign Ministry spokesman Bahram Qasemi denounced the accusations as "part of a failed and threadbare plot that the U.S. and some regional countries are still pursuing to foment Iranophobia."

"Iran's presence and influence in the region is inherent and natural," he told reporters during his weekly news

Qasemi was also asked about new evidence in a lawsuit, which holds Saudi Arabia responsible for the September 11, 2001 attacks.

Without naming Saudi Arabia, he said the 9/11 issue is clear and "a certain country" is accused of involvement in the attacks. He said he hoped justice would be served and that no such attacks would ever occur again.

The lawsuit alleges that the Saudi embassy in Washington paid for two Saudi nationals, living undercover in the U.S. as students, to fly from the city of Phoenix to Washington "in a dry run for the 9/11 attacks" two years before their occurrence, the New York Post reported on Saturday.

The U.S. used the attacks as a pretext to invade Afghanistan and Iraq, plunging the two countries into chaos and violence which continues to this day

Qasemi said there is no military solution to the conflict in Afghanistan and the continuation of foreign military presence in the country will further complicate the situ-

The spokesman said countries interested in seeing calm in Afghanistan have to reduce their meddling there and allow the Afghan people to determine their own fate through dialogue.

FM Zarif:

Countries Don't See U.S. as Reliable **Negotiating Partner**

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Iran's Foreign Minister Muhammad Javad Zarif says the belligerent U.S. rhetoric about a multilateral accord with Iran has dented other countries' faith in negotiations with Washington.

In an interview with Iran's Borna News, Zarif referred to "very dangerous" tensions between the U.S. and North Korea, suggesting that Pyongyang was not interested in talks with Washington because it

did not trust the U.S. Zarif said a solution has to

be reached peacefully, and threats and pressure have to be avoided.

He said the U.S. suffers from a credibility problem and negotiating with it is not viewed as a favorable option.

"Some of the rhetoric that the U.S. has adopted about the JCPOA since Mr. Trump took office has cast doubt on U.S.'s reputation as a credible negotiating partner," Zarif said, referring to the Iran nuclear accord by its official abbre-

viation.

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UAE Closes Down Iranian School in Sharjah

TEHRAN (Press TV) -- UAE officials have closed down an Iranian school in the emirate's third city of Sharjah, refusing to extend its permit over what they have called illegal construction within the facility.

Ali Husseini, the Iranian Education Ministry's deputy for international affairs, said the facility had been leased and had not undertaken any construction activities, ISNA reported.

"Our political relations with the Emirates are not good and, therefore, pressure is being exerted on us to close down Iranian schools,' he said.

Iranian schools have been operating in the UAE for more than 20 years but in recent years, they have been facing a number of problems due to certain "political complications," especially those in Sharjah and Abu Dhabi.

Husseini said Iran's Education Ministry was trying to resolve the issue in cooperation with the Foreign Ministry and to have the school's permit reinstated.

The school had 1,500 students, including 500 Afghans, who have now been transferred to Dubaibased schools, the official pointed

Speaking to Mehr News Agency, Husseini said schools in Dubai demand much higher tuition fees

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
