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Pompoe's 'Hypocritical Absurdities' About Iran's Missiles

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Iran on Thursday urged the United States and its allies to stop their "absurd" accusations about Iranian missile tests, a day after Washington urged the UN to adopt punitive measures against Tehran.

"U.S. & allies should cease their hypocritical absurdities about Iran's missiles," Iranian Foreign Minister Muhammad Javad Zarif wrote on Twitter.

"Facts speak for themselves. It's they who sell \$100s of billions in arms to butcher Yemenis," he added, referring to the devastating Saudi war backed by the West against Yemen.

Beneath the text, Zarif published a graphic detailing arms exports to Saudi Arabia from 2013 to 2017 using figures from the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI).

The U.S. accounted for 61 percent of those arms sales to Riyadh, Britain made up 23 percent of sales, and deals from France accounted for four percent, according to the chart.

U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Wednesday urged the UN Security Council to take punitive action against Iran to limit its ballistic missile program, which Washington says poses a threat to the region and beyond.

A day earlier, Iran confirmed it had carried out a missile test and reiterated its intention to keep up ballistic activities despite Western condemnation.

Paris and London said Tehran's

bragged about violating Resolution 2231; outlined plans for more violations; confirmed that U.S. and allies rely on defunct Resolution 1929 provision on missiles; turned an isolated U.S. into 1st permanent Security Council member to PUNISH other countries for COMPLYING," he wrote.

Russian Ambassador Vassily Nebenzia also took a swipe at Pompeo as he denounced attempts to "fan anti-Iranian hysteria."

"There is no proof that the ballistic missiles can carry a nuclear load," Nebenzia told the council.

Nebenzia added that some council members were using Wednesday's meeting "to discuss the so-called regional behavior of Iran, which they depict as though it were the only source of all the woes in the Middle East."

"What they do not voice is any kind of a substantive proposal on this topic and sometimes we're left with the impression that the only goal is to further escalate anti-Iran hysteria and to demonize Iran," he said.

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Iran's nuclear chief Ali Akbar Salehi said Thursday Tehran is not "bluffing" when it says it is ready to resume the 20-percent uranium enrichment if the Europeans fail to save the 2015 nuclear accord.

Salehi said that under the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, Iran accepted to curb its nuclear program as part of its confidencebuilding measures, but those measures would not obstruct the peaceful activities of Iran's nuclear industry.

"Now I'm emphasizing once again that if the establishment wants, we can easily return to the 20-percent enrichment, and meet the country's needs at any level and volume," he said during a tour of the Fordow nuclear facility.

and provided the Arab country

technological knowhow to immediately begin higher-level uranium enrichment and has refrained from doing so in a bid to preserve the nuclear deal.

Iran in June reopened a nuclear plant idle for nine years after U.S. President Donald Trump pulled Washington out of the 2015 nuclear accord.

It came after Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei ordered the Atomic Energy Organization of Iran (AEOI) to start preparations to upgrade enrichment capacity in case the Europeans fail to save the nuclear accord.

The plant for the production of UF6, the feedstock for centrifuge machines that enrich uranium, was relaunched and a barrel of yellow cake was delivered there.

The UF6 factory, which had been inactive since 2009 due to a lack of yellow cake, is part of the Isfahan

uranium conversion facility.


According to AEOI's statement on its website, Iran has imported a huge amount of yellow cake since the nuclear deal in 2015, and has also produced some domestically.

The International Atomic Energy Agency said on June 5 that the AEOI had informed it of "tentative" plans to resume production of UF6. The nuclear deal allows Iran to enrich uranium to 3.67 percent and

caps its stock of enriched uranium hexafluoride at 300 kilograms (660 pounds).

Salehi said on Thursday, "Enrichment is currently underway, but we would put aside the 300kg limit whenever we wish, and would do the enrichment at any volume and level."

"We currently have 1,044 centrifuges in Fordow, and if the establishment wants, we will restart 20-percent uranium enrichment in Fordow."

The official expressed hope the remaining parties to the nuclear agreement would deliver on their promises and implement their commitments in order to fill the gap left by U.S. withdrawal from deal.

Otherwise, he said, Iran will have to reduce its commitments under the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA), as the nuclear deal is officially called.

"I would like to warn that this is not a bluff; I have kept my word whenever I've said something. Now I'm emphasizing once again that if the establishment wants, we can easily return to the 20-percent enrichment, and meet the country's needs at any level and volume," Salehi said.

The European Union has vowed to establish a mechanism to facilitate non-dollar transactions with Iran.

EU foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini said Monday, "I will expect this instrument to be established in the coming weeks before the end of the year as a way to protect and promote legitimate business."

"Iran never sent any explosive belts to Iraq; Iran never violated the sovereignty and territorial integrity of our country," he said, in an apparent dig at Saudi Arabia. Daesh militants made swift advances in much of northern and western Iraq over the summer of 2014, after capturing large swaths of northern Syria.

Iran is famously known as the first country which rushed to Iraq's help as Daesh terrorists reached Baghdad's gates. two months after terrorists abducted a number of Iranian border guards at a military post.

A memorandum of understanding (MoU) on border security was signed following three days of negotiations between Iranian and Pakistani security and political officials in Iran's southeastern city of Zahedan, Tasnim news agency reported Friday.

It called for boosting cooperation on preventing terrorists from crossing joint borders and fuel smuggling as well as human trafficking, it said.

The Iranian side also called on the Pakistanis to secure the release of remaining border guards, who were military officials.

The so-called Jaish-ul-Adl terrorist group, based in Pakistan, attacked a border post in Iran's Mirjaveh on October 15 and took hostage 14 border guards, local Basij forces, and members of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC).

Iranian military forces along the southeastern border areas are frequently attacked by terrorist groups coming from Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Tehran has frequently asked the two neighbors to step up security at the common border to prevent terrorist attacks on Iranian forces.

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Commander of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC)'s Aerospace Force said on Thursday said Iran has obtained the most advanced technical knowhow to make missiles, drones and radars thanks to the tireless efforts of its experts. Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei underlined the need to step up efforts in all areas to thwart hostile plots against Iran.
