Auspicious Start to Further Expansion of Iran-Pakistan Fraternal Ties

Pakistan's Prime Minister made an auspicious start to his first ever formal visit to the Islamic Republic as the Executive Head of his country by opening his account with Iran with a spectacular "Six" when he landed in holy Mashhad on Sunday and straightaway paid his respects at the sacred shrine of Imam Reza (AS) – the 8th Infallible Heir of Prophet Muhammad (AS) – and that too on the blessed 15th of Sha'ban, which both Shi'a and Sunni Muslims mark as the birthday of the Awaited Saviour of mankind, Imam Mahdi (AS) – may God hasten his reappearance to rid Planet Earth with all vestiges of oppression and corruption through establishment of the global government of peace, prosperity and justice.

Imran Khan then stroked a scintillating cover drive to score "Four" more the next day in Tehran when he announced formation of a joint Iran-Pakistan anti-terrorism border force to weed out terrorists during talks with his host, President Hassan Rouhani.

Next he showed his prowess as an all-rounder on the political pitch as well when he discussed at the two countries' joint chamber of commerc, Pakistan's purchase of gas, petroleum, electricity and various other goods from Iran thereby dismantling the sanctions castle of the US president, "lock, stock and barrel" with a fast-paced "Yorker" that has caught Donald Trump and his team of thugs on the wrong foot.

His brilliant captaincy of the national cricket team that had brought many laurels for Pakistan including the One-Day International World Cup, now faces an acid test in the diplomatic corridors of Islamabad as the Leader of the Islamic Revolution, Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei, granted Imran Khan and his delegation an audience, where he provided valuable guidelines for fair play in the political arena, without the least concern for the state terrorism of the US, which frequently targets Pakistan.

Holy Mashhad hosts at least 400,000 Pakistani pilgrims every year, and Imran Khan, who humbly prayed at the holy shrine of Imam Reza (AS) like any other ordinary pilgrim, expressed gratitude for the local government of Khorasan for excellent facilities provided to visitors from Pakistan.

He said the guiding light for his government are the principles on which the Prophet of Islam established his state of social justice in Medina – which reached its pinnacle in Kufa, Iraq during the 4-year model government of Imam Ali ibn Abi Tale (AS).

He said Pakistanis can never forget that Iran always stood with Pakistan in

Pakistan's relations with Iran are marked by close historic and cultural linkages and strong people-to-people exchanges. Both countries are also members of the Economic Cooperation Organisation (ECO) and the Organisation of Islamic Cooperation (OIC).

According to Rouhani, he and his guest agreed on the need for both sides to expand joint efforts to bring peace to Afghanistan. He also said Tehran was interested in expanding trade between Iran's Chabahar and Pakistan's Gawader ports by connecting them with a railway.

The Iranian president noted that Iran, Turkey and Pakistan as cofounders of the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO) could increase economic cooperation by connecting their railway systems. This, he said, would open a corridor from Europe to China.

Other security issues discussed in the meeting included US President Donald Trump's recent attempt to label the famed humanitarian defence organisation, the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC), as 'terrorist' and his mischievous endorsement Israel's illegal annexation of Syria's Golan Heights

Addressing reports about Saudi and US pressure on Pakistan to join an Arab-Israeli front against Islamic Iran in the region, Rouhani said Imran Khan had assured him that Pakistan "has never joined and will never join any coalition."

All said, it would be interesting how Imran Khan bats or bowls without resorting to stone-walling tactics against neighbouring Iran.

TEHRAN (Dispatches) – Iran's President Hassan Rouhani on Monday highlighted the major role that the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) plays in countering threats against the country.

China, Iran Discuss Expansion of Military Ties

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Iranian Navy chief Rear Admiral Hussein Khanzadi, who is Qingdao at the invitation of his Chinese counterpart Shen Jinlong, has announced Tehran's readiness to expand naval cooperation with the Asian giant.

"There are very good capacities for military cooperation between the navies of the two countries and we hope that this trip will lead to many achievements in this regard," Khanzadi said.

The two countries have long been close partners. Some domesticallyproduced Iranian weaponry, such as air defense systems, naval missiles, armored vehicles, artillery and small arms, are based on Chinese

The two countries signed an agreement to boost defense cooperation in November 2016.

Khanzadi is in Qingdao to attend China's navy parade to mark its 70th anniversary at which the military is expected to display new warships including nuclear submarines and destroyers.

The Iranian navy chief said he was participating as the representative of the Iranian armed forces, given the high importance of the international event.

His visit indicates the mutual understanding of the two countries and their armed forces, the commander added.

Khanzadi also expressed hope that Iranian and Chinese navies would strengthen "educational, technical and operational" cooperation in the

Iran and China have close diplomatic, economic, trade and energy ties, and in recent years have developed their military relations as well

Flood-Hit Areas Struggle to Emerge From Disaster

AHVAZ, Iran (Dispatches) - Two weeks since the storms started, relentless rain and flooding throughout Iran has left some 2 million people facing a humanitarian crisis.

The deluge has swamped large swaths of the country, from the mountains in the north down to the Persian Gulf in the south.

Twenty-five out of 31 of Iran's provinces have been affected. Officials say 76 people have been killed so far, with some 150,000 homes partially or completely destroyed. Bridges across the country and miles upon miles of road have been left unusable. Authorities say the estimated bill to repair the damage stands at least \$2.5 bil-

The country's agriculture sector, which makes up about 14 percent of Iran's GDP, has been badly hit.

In the oil-rich city of Ahvaz, in Khuzestan province, a local sports stadium is now home to rows of Red Crescent tents lined

up next to each other.

The aid group, the Muslim world's equivalent to the Red Cross, is working with the government to respond to the disas-

Hussein and Farideh Abdekhani, an elderly couple whose village was consumed by the floods, have sought shelter there for the past 10 days along with their daughter, son-in-law and two grandchildren.

Farideh, a seamstress, told NBC News that the family had lost everything they had worked so hard for. "Between us we had two fridges, three heaters and a television. Along with our home, it's all gone," she said. "All we have left are the

clothes we are wearing," she added, tugging the shirt her husband was wearing and pulling on her chador. "We have nothing. I don't know how we are going to rebuild our lives," she

In the nearby village of Hamidiyeh, farmer Jasem, 26, looked out at what was his once

his livelihood.

His family had spent decades building their family home and toiling on arable land. Now they fear they will never rebuild what they have lost.

Jasem said he will move to the capital Tehran, some 600 miles from where he has spent his entire life, and try to find work in a restaurant.

Twelve percent of the country's land is agricultural, like that which once proved so fertile for Jasem and his family.

"The heads of the American regime have revealed their true vicious and inhuman nature," President Hassan Rouhani said at a cabinet meeting screened live on state TV.

The Red Crescent are doing what they can to reach these often rural communities devastated by the floods, but damaged infrastructure has hampered their mobility. A helicopter allows them to

reach Lorestan province, a mountainous region in the country's west.

Because of U.S. sanctions,

Iran has been unable obtain parts for the aircraft over the last 40 years. Instead they have almost entirely rebuilt the chop-

pers themselves. Nasser, 81, a taxi driver in Khorramabad, the capital of Lorestan province, told NBC News: "I have lived here my whole life and have never seen anything like this."

In the city of Pol-e-dokhtar soldiers from the army and the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) are leading the clean-up operation.

Alongside clerics and volunteers they clear rubble, divert water, build dykes and distribute food, medicine and tents.

One of the guards at a temporary station saw a van passing by with IRGC members on board carrying shovels. "Come and get some food, terrorists," he shouted, an apparent tonguein-cheek reference to their recent designation as a foreign terrorist organization by the Trump administration.

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
