World Leaders Should Join Forces to End Syria Crisis

NEW YORK (Press TV) - Senior UN officials have called on world leaders to join forces in a bid to bring an end to the Syria crisis which has exacted a heavy toll on civilians.

"We need world leaders to put aside their differences and use their influence to bring about meaningful change in Syria," the heads of the UN agencies for humanitarian affairs, health, food aid, refugees, Palestinian refugees, and children said in a joint statement on Friday, adding that the crisis has led to an "unconscionable" human cost.

The UN officials warned that the future generation of Syria is in danger due to the international community's failure to find ways to terminate the crisis which has entered its fifth year.

"The future of a generation is at stake. The credibility of the international community is at stake," the statement added.

So far over 210,000 people have reportedly died in Syria, which has been gripped by deadly violence since March 2011.

New figures show that over 76,000 people, including thousands of children, lost their lives in Syria in 2014. Nearly 4 million Syrians have left their country since the beginning of the crisis, and 7.6 million civilians have been internally displaced.

The unabated conflict "continues to exact an unconscionable human cost. A crisis that the international community has failed to stop," the heads of the UN agencies said.

In the statement, the UN officials also stressed they will press ahead with their support for the Syrians who have been "caught in the middle of this war. People who are vulnerable. Besieged. With nowhere to go."

The UN officials particularly brought up the suffering of the Syrian children and youth, saying, "Children and young people are subject to and surrounded by violence, despair and deprivation."

They added that world leaders should use their influence to alleviate the tragedy of the Syrian people. UN Secretary General Ban Kimoon on Thursday called on the UN Security Council (UNSC) to take decisive measures to resolve the humanitarian crisis in war-torn Syria.

"The Syrian people feel increasingly abandoned by the world as they enter the fifth year of the war that has torn their country apart," Ban said in a statement, noting, "I call upon the Security Council to take determined measures to resolve this crisis."

On Thursday, 21 human rights and aid groups, including the International Rescue Committee, the Norwegian Refugee Council, Handicap International, the Syrian Relief Network, Oxfam and Save the Children, criticized the UNSC for "failing

400 Illegal Migrants Detained Off Turkish Coast

ANKARA (Dispatches) - Turkey has captured some 400 illegal migrants traveling on board a ship destined for Italy, showing that Ankara is determined to counter the rising flow of migrants travelling through the country to Europe.

Turkish officials on Thursday stopped the vessel which was sailing through the Dardanelles Straits, in Turkey's northwestern Canakkale Province.

The vessel had allegedly ignored warning shots. Security forces then boarded the ship and arrested all illegal travelers aboard.

Most of the migrants on the Doğan Kartal were Syrians, according to Canakkale Governor Ahmet Cinar.

"According to our initial information, around 400 illegal Syrian

immigrants were on board," Cinar said, adding that the operation on the ship did not result in any clashes between the security forces and the migrants.

The governor denied the assault

was meant for a special security purpose, saying, "Our goal was to prevent people on board from any damage.

The captured migrants have been transferred to Gallipoli, a port west of Dardanelles.

The migrants reportedly chanted "to Italy or death" when they faced the security forces. The crew of the ship which included three Syrian and two Turkish nationals were also detained.

Turkey has become a major transit hub for illegal migrants from Asia and the Middle East who embark on risky journeys through water to reach Europe.

According to the United Nations, more than 1,900 people were killed in 2014 in incidents related to migrants in the Mediterranean Sea.

Pakistan Orders Release of Suspect in Mumbai Attacks

ISLAMABAD (Press TV) – A top court in Pakistan has cancelled the detention order of Zaki-ur-Rehman Lakhvi, the alleged mastermind behind the November 2008 terror attacks in the Indian city of Mumbai.

Justice Noorul Haq of Islamabad High Court on Friday accepted the 55-year-old's appeal and declared void the detention orders of Lakhvi, ordering his immediate release.

Lakhvi, who has been imprisoned

in Adiala jail in the city of Rawalpindi, was granted bail by an antiterror court on December 18, which spurred the fury of Indian officials. However, he was later detained under a public order law that was suspended by Islamabad's High Court on December 29.

Although Islamabad High Court suspended that order, the Supreme Court reinstated it in January.

Home Affairs reacted to the announcement saying, "It is the responsibility of the Pakistan government to take all legal measures to ensure that Lakhvi does not come out of jail.'

The Mumbai attacks left 166 people dead and were blamed on the banned Pakistani militant group, Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT).

Sex Offenses in Zionist Regime's Military Jumped by 40% in 2014

WEST BANK (Dispatches) The Zionist regime's military officials have admitted that sex offenses in the regime's army increased by 40 percent in 2014.

On Friday, the chief prosecutor of the Israeli army, Udi Ben Eliezer, said that 37 Zionist officers and soldiers were indicted for sex offenses in 2014, showing a 40-percent jump in comparison with the previous year.

He added that most of the sexual harassment cases were perpetrated by military officials against their subordinates.

One of the indictments concerned a Zionist commander who pressured his female subordinates into sexual relationships "while utilizing his authority over them as their direct commander," Eliezer confessed.

He also lashed out at the highranking officials of the regime's military for turning a blind eye to the frequent sex offenses committed under their com-

"I expect commanders not to keep it to themselves but to come forward and report it. Sometimes we discover that there were large groups of people who knew of an abusive person for a long time, and no one was surprised when an investigation was opened. Commanders must not stand idly by and let these things happen," he stated.

The issue of sexual misconduct in the occupying regime's army has given rise to heated debates over the past years.

In 2014, it was revealed that the senior officials of the Israeli

The Leader said a "Zionist clown" had delivered a speech in Washington, an apparent reference to Benjamin Netanyahu's address to U.S. Congress earlier this month, in which he argued against the emerging nuclear agreement.

Ayatollah Khamenei also repeated a call for Iran's economy to diversify away from oil revenues to reduce the effectiveness of international sanctions isolating the oil sector. "If the country and economy were not dependent on oil revenues... could the enemy harm us with sanctions?

On Wednesday, President Barack Obama extended Washington's decadesold "state of emergency" with respect to Iran that keeps sanctions against the Islamic Republic in place for one more

Obama informed Capitol Hill that he was continuing the "state of emergency" against Iran because the crisis in Tehran-Washington relations "has not been resolved"

The state of emergency has been in place since 1979 when Tehran and Washington severed diplomatic ties.

"...certain actions and policies of the government of Iran continue to pose an unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security, foreign policy, and economy of the United States," Obama claimed in a notice to Congress.

"For these reasons, I have determined that it is necessary to continue the national emergency declared with respect to Iran and to maintain in force comprehensive sanctions," Obama wrote.

The state of emergency forms the basis for most U.S. sanctions against Iran. The extension came at a time when Tehran and the P5+1 are seeking to seal a comprehensive nuclear deal by July 1.
