Time for Nuclear Weapons Convention Is Now

Eastern Europe is in flames and the bogus war on terror launched by nucleararmed regimes across the Middle East and North Africa has only produced one thing: instability and chaos – not only in the region but across the globe.

The situation on the ground is so dire that the international civil society has to do something about it before the nuclear-armed regimes start the long-dreaded nuclear war – Ukraine is still in flames.

Just about all developing nations have also started to sour on the present push by the self-styled world powers to control the lucrative business of nuclear technology through dominating international bodies such as the United Nations Security Council and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA).

There is an emerging rift between the world's developing countries and the big powers as regards NPT-illegal punitive measures against peaceful nations such as Iran.

For many countries, which have questioned the legality of the sanctions regime, Iran's ill-treatment at the hands of arrogant world powers seeking to control access to vital and lucrative technologies is starting to resonate.

True to form, the developing nations don't trust the Western powers given their double-standard approach toward Iran's civilian nuclear program and that of the Zionist regime which possesses over 200 nuclear warheads.

This obviously indicates that the developing nations are not comfortable with the idea of solely relying on others to provide them with the nuclear technology. Any doubters should ask the United Nations General Assembly.

Interestingly, they are reflecting on the comments made by Iranian government officials that: no country can solely rely on others to provide it with the technology and materials that are becoming so vital for its development and for the welfare of its people. Nations have lost their trust in the Security Council and see it as the instrument of a few nuclear-armed powers to advance their own agenda.

And to steer clear of similar future disputes for other nations seeking the peaceful technology at the IAEA and the Security Council, a complete ban of all nuclear weapons through an intercontinental convention could be proposed. This is because as long as the U.S., China, Russia, France, Britain, India, Pakistan and Israel make no definitive moves to eliminate their nuclear arsenals, the danger of nuclear war fighting will never go away and hence there will be simply no realistic prospect of a nuclear-free world.

As anticipated, it is about time the civil society banned and eliminated nuclear weapons since they are illegal and their illegality should be recognized through a legally binding nuclear weapons convention at the UN.

To start with, the international initiative can deal with the issue and conclude the convention. The body can also establish an ad hoc committee with a manate to begin all-party talks to this end.

TRIPOLI (Dispatches) -- Two bombs exploded at the gate of the Iranian ambassador's residence in the Libyan capital Tripoli on Sunday although nobody was hurt in the blast, Libyan security officials said.

Iran's official IRNA news agency confirmed the blasts and that there had been no casualties, adding that Iran had previously suspended operations at its embassy.

"Two devices were laid, one exploded first and then the other. The point of the second bomb was to create confusion," Colonel Jumaa al-Mashri from the National Security Agency told Tripoli-based Al-Nabaa television.

A Reuters reporter at the scene saw the second device going off some 30 minutes after the first one. Minor damage could be seen at the gate.





Netanyahu is resolved to take on the Obama administration with a speech that he is scheduled to deliver to the U.S. Congress on March 3, in which he will likely warn against an deal with Iran that doesn't do away with its uranium enrichment program.



Intentional Silence

Leader's Aide Tells UN Envoy: **Afghans Should Rely on Own Strength**

TEHRAN (Press TV) -- A senior Iranian official says Afghanistan does not depend on any foreign state to deal with its ongoing challenges.

"Afghanistan's problems must be solved by people in this country, internally and without interference of foreign countries," Ali Akbar Velayati, a senior advisor to Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei, said here in meeting with UN special representative to Afghanistan, Nicholas Haysom.

Noting that Iran and Afghanistan enjoy many commonalities, Velayati said Iran has been sheltering Afghan refugees for four decades.

All countries sharing borders with Afghanistan are prepared to help settle problems in the war-hit country, he added.

"The Islamic Republic of Iran has always sought to strengthen the legal government in Afghanistan," Velayati said, warning that extremist groups are likely to become active in Afghanistan despite efforts by the Kabul government.

The UN envoy said Iran plays a valuable role in hosting Afghan refugees and fighting narcotics produced in Afghanistan.

Haysom added that the ongoing problems in Afghanistan should be settled only through dialog and in cooperation with Afghan forces.

The U.S. and its allies invaded Afghanistan shortly after the September 11, 2001 attacks in New York City as part of Washington's so-called war on terror.

Lebanon Offered Aid in **Building Dam**

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- Tehran announced Sunday its willingness to help Lebanon better manage its water resources by offering its assistance in the construction of a much needed dam.

Lebanese Environment Minister Muhammad Machnouk met with Iran's Energy Minister Hamid Chitchian here, with the latter saying that Tehran's private construction companies are at the disposal of the Lebanese government if it agrees to the construction of an Iran-sponsored dam.

In 2012, Iran granted Lebanon a \$40 million cash donation to finance the construction of the Balaa dam in Batroun. The Iranian assistance drew heavy criticism for Lebanese political leaders.

MP Boutros Harb said the Iranian access to Batroun was for political purposes and would serve as a prelude to allowing the armed entry of Iran and its allies to the region.

The Iranian energy minister confirmed Sunday that Tehran did not end up funding the building of the Balaa dam, which is currently under construction Chitchian said his meeting with Machnouk also touched on the pollution of water resources, the issue of droughts and other strategic concerns relating to water resources.

Machnouk is on an official visit to Tehran where he participated Saturday in the country's 14th environmental conference.

After the conference, Machnouk praised the advancement of the environmental sector in Iran.

Foreign Threats
