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Speaker Warns of New Anti-Iran Measures

TEHRAN (Tasnim) - Speaker of Iran's Parliament Ali Larijani on Saturday called for vigilance and caution in the face of U.S. measures against Iran, saying that Washington is longing to make new troubles for Tehran via sanctions.

Larijani said those countries that used to hinder Iran's progress in the past may now resort to alternative ways and cause new troubles for the country through different methods.

Such issues and measures, therefore, must be closely monitored, he added in a meeting with the Iranian parliamentary staff held here in Tehran on the occasion of New Persian Year (Nowruz).

The Iranian speaker further highlighted the U.S. plots to impose new sanctions against Iran on pretexts other than the country's peaceful nuclear program, saying it "indicates the necessity for being vigilant, watchful, and cautious in the face of their measures."

Under current circumstances, the Westerners are seeking to impose new scenarios against Iran, Larijani warned, urging increased unity and solidarity among Iranian parties against the country's en-

He referred to recent remarks by Western countries against Iran's missile program, saying they demonstrated their ill intentions.

"None of the ballistic missiles made by Iran has been designed to be capable of carrying nuclear warheads; therefore, Westerners' new adventures (against Iran's missile program) do not have any legal basis and are mere propaganda," he went on to

After the termination of nuclear-related anti-Iran sanctions in mid-January as per the nuclear deal between Tehran and world powers, the United States imposed new sanctions against Tehran later in January over its ballistic missile program, even as the world hailed the implementation of the historic nuclear

Sanctions Will Not Hinder Iran's Power

TEHRAN (Dispatches) Iran's Navy commander Rear Admiral Habibollah Sayyari said Saturday sanctions by the United States and its allies will fail to hinder the country's plans to boost its military

"Regardless of opposition from the U.S. and its allies, our plans will be implemented based on requirements to defend the country's maritime borders," Sayyari told reporters in the southern Iranian port city of Bandar Abbas on the sidelines of a ceremony to welcome the 38th fleet of the Iranian Navy.

Despite sanctions, the Iranian naval forces have succeeded in making great achievements, Sayyari said, adding that if all countries opposing the Islamic establishment

pool their resources they will fail to make any breakthrough to hinder the Iranian Navy's progress.

He downplayed the impact of sanctions against the Islamic Republic and said Iran's Navy has managed to manufacture military equipment, including destroyers such as Jamaran, Damavand and Sahand, under such embargoes.

He added that Iran's Navy would pay no heed to foreigners' talks about the country's maneuvers aimed at enhancing its defense power.

In recent years, Iran has made great achievements in its defense sector and conducted numerous military

Iran has repeatedly assured other countries that its military might poses no threat to other states, insisting that the country's defense doctrine is entirely based on deterrence.

Iran's Navy chief further said the 38th fleet returned home after accomplishing its mission in international waters during some 75 days.

He added that the flotilla conveyed Iran's message of peace and friendship to other countries and carried out measures to fight piracy.

Sayyari said the 39th flotilla of the Iranian Navy, consisting of Alvand destroyer, had set off for the Bay of Bengal to attend a ceremony marking the anniversary of India's Independence Day (observed annually on August 15) and returned home before the 38th fleet.

He also noted that the 40th fleet, comprising Alborz destroyer and Qom logisticcombat warships, would set off for high seas in near fu-

In recent years, Iran's Navy has increased its presence in international waters to protect naval routes and provide security for merchant vessels and tankers.

The Iranian Navy has also been conducting patrols in the Gulf of Aden since November 2008 in line with international efforts against piracy in order to safeguard merchant containers and oil tankers owned or leased by Iran or other countries.

Iran's Navy has managed to foil several attacks on both Iranian and foreign tankers during its missions in international waters.

Three Policemen Killed in **Anti-Drug Fight**

TEHRAN (Press TV) -- A drug smuggler has killed three Iranian police officers and severely injured another one in the city of Kazeroun, in the southern province of Fars, a local official says. Chief prosecutor of Kazeroun County Abdol Hussein Lotfi said on Friday that the officers were shot dead by the trafficker at a police station a day earlier.

He added that the incident took place when the police officers arrested the smuggler who was carrying an unspecified amount of heroin.

Lotfi added that the trafficker then opened fire at the police officers and killed three of them and injured one who was transferred to hospital.

The smuggler, who had been previously convicted of crimes, is currently held in detention, the official said.

Despite high economic and human costs, the Islamic Republic has been actively fighting drug trafficking over the past three decades.

Iran has spent more than \$700 million to seal the borders and prevent the transit of narcotics destined for European, Arab and Central Asian countries. The war on drug trade originating from Afghanistan has claimed the lives of nearly 4,000 Iranian police officers over the past 34

In December 2015, Iranian Interior Minister Abdolreza Rahmani Fazli and the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) Executive Director Yury Fedotov signed an agreement in the Austrian capital of Vienna to fight the flow of narcotics into Iran from neighboring countries, mainly Afghanistan.

Iran, which has a 900-kilometer common border with Afghanistan, has been used as the main conduit for smuggling Afghan drugs to drug kingpins in Europe.
