Fiction of the Holocaust Has Robbed Minds in the West of Realities

Yesterday, the 27th of January was one such fictitious day which the United Nations was forced to declare in 2005 by the distorters of history as 'International Holocaust Remembrance Day'.

Daesh Cell Dismantled in Western Iran After Clashes



Iran's western borders have been the scene of clashes with terrorists based in Iraq or Turkey.

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- The Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) and Iranian intelligence forces have captured several members of a Daesh team in western Iran in a joint operation.

The public relations department of IRGC's Najaf Base announced on Saturday that almost all members of a 21-strong Takfiri terrorist cell were arrested after armed clashes with Iranian security forces.

The statement said the clashes were continuing with the terrorists who had entered the country through the western borders.

Iran's Intelligence Ministry said earlier this month that Iranian security forces had dismantled a terrorist group and arrested its members in the country's northwestern province of West Azarbaijan.

The ministry said in a statement that the terrorist group "which had infiltrated into Iran with the aim of fueling" a wave of protest over rising prices were put under surveillance in the city of Piranshahr.

The IRGC also dismantled a terrorist group in October in an operation in West Azarbaijan.

IRGC ground forces launched the operation after receiving informa-

tion that a terrorist team of four had infiltrated the Chaldoran region of the province and had killed two locals.

Iran has arrested dozens of terrorists since twin terrorist attacks in the Iranian capital of Tehran in June 2017.

Last June, gunmen mounted almost simultaneous assaults on Iran's parliament and the mausoleum of the late founder of the Islamic Republic Imam Khomeini. Daesh claimed responsibility for the strikes. The twin attacks killed 17 people and injured over 50 more.

Iranian Official: Zionist Regime at Its 'Weakest'

TEHRAN (Dispatches) -- A senior Iranian official said on Saturday the "bogus and illegitimate" regime of Israel is currently at its "weakest" position, stressing that Tel Aviv will not be allowed to trifle with the security of Iran and the Middle East.

"Despite Daesh's major assistance to Zionists in weakening and destroying a part of Muslim countries, undoubtedly, Tel Aviv is today at its weakest," Hussein Amir-Abdollahian, the Iranian parliament speaker's special adviser on international affairs, said.

He added that due to its fear of the resistance front, the occupying regime seeks ensure its survival by constructing a high concrete wall around itself.

He said neither Saudi Arabia nor the United States can save the Zionist regime, adding the resistance front will have the final say on the restoration of the rights of the oppressed Palestinian people.

Amir-Abdollahian also said U.S. President Donald Trump's initiative to recognize Jerusalem Al-Quds

as the so-called capital of Israel resembles a "wild dream" more than anything else.

The U.S. president announced his decision last month, including U.S. relocation of its embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem Al-Quds.

The United Nations General Assembly has voted in favor of a resolution that calls on the U.S. to withdraw its controversial recognition of Jerusalem Al-Quds as the Israeli "capital".

Amir-Abdollahian's remarks came after Iran's ambassador and deputy permanent representative to the UN, Es'haq Al-e Habib, said on Thursday that the Zionist regime's occupation of the Palestinian land was at the heart of all conflicts in the Middle East.

In an address to the UN Security Council Open Debate on "Situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian Question," the Iranian envoy said Tel Aviv was making all efforts to dismiss all the rights of Palestinian statehood and to entrench the occupation.

Netanyahu Admits 'Extraordinary' Ties With Arab Rulers

DAVOS (Dispatches) -- The occupying regime of Israel's PM Benjamin Netanyahu has hailed close ties between Tel Aviv and some Arab countries, saying that Iran is one of the common concerns of the "extraordinary" alliance.

Asked whether there is an anti-Iran front with Israel, Saudi Arabia and Egypt as crucial players, Netanyahu told CNN's Fareed Zakaria at the World Economic Forum in this Swiss town that the alliance was an "extraordinary thing".

"I agree that there is an alignment of Israel and other countries in the Middle East that would've been unimaginable 10 years ago, and certainly in my lifetime. I never saw anything like it," the Zionist premier said.

"Yes, it starts with a common concern for a common enemy which

is radical Islam, either of the radical Sunnis, Daesh, before that Al-Qaeda, which Israel fights ... and also our common stance against Iran," he added.

The Zionist regime, however, is widely believed to have been cooperating with terrorist groups that are currently losing ground against the Syrian army.

Israel has frequently attacked military targets in Syria and provided weapons to anti-Damascus militants as well as medical treatment to the Takfiri elements wounded in the war-torn Arab country.

In September 2016, the Israeli daily Ha'aretz quoted lawmaker Akram Hasoon as saying that the regime was directly aiding the Takfiri terrorist group Jabhat Fateh al-Sham, formerly known as Nusra Front.

In November 2017, Zionist war

minister Avigdor Lieberman extended the hand of "friendship" to Arab countries, calling on them to form an alliance against the Islamic Republic.

The Israeli-Arab alliance is widely believed to have set the stage for U.S. President Donald Trump's recent policy shift on Jerusalem Al-Quds, which drew condemnations and protests worldwide.

Numerous reports have suggested growing contacts between the occupying regime of Israel and Saudi Arabia in the past few months though they have no formal diplomatic relations.

Saudi Arabia is widely viewed as the homeland of radical Wahhabism, the same ideology influencing Takfiri outfits which have been wreaking havoc in the Middle East and beyond for years.

Assad: Anti-Terror Fight to Continue With Iran's Help

DAMASCUS (Dispatches) -- Iran's top negotiator at Syria peace talks Hussein Jaber Ansari met with Syrian President Bashar al-Assad here on Saturday and discussed the most recent developments in the Arab country, especially the situation in Afrin, and mutual cooperation between Tehran and Damascus.

The meeting was the latest round of talks over Syria's National Dialogue Congress which is to be held in Russia's Sochi on January 29 and 30.

Assad reiterated Syria's resolve to continue battling terrorism with the help of Iran and Russia.

Assad and Jaber Ansari also discussed ways to enhance the strategic Syrian-Iranian ties in various areas, especially in fighting terrorism and mutual efforts for the success of the Sochi meeting.

They also exchanged views on Turkey's military assault in Syria's northwestern region of Afrin, saying the military campaign was aimed at grabbing Syrian territories, backing terrorist organizations operating inside the conflict-plagued Arab country, and torpedoing peace efforts on Syria.

Last week, Turkey launched a new air and ground operation around Afrin to oust YPG militants, which Ankara views as a terror organization and the Syrian branch of the outlawed Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK).

The offensive began days after the U.S. said it would work with Kurdish militants to set up a 30,000-strong force inside Syria near the Turkish border.

Jaber Ansari further stressed Iran's unwavering support for Syria in its fight against terrorism and in the country's reconstruction process.

In a separate meeting earlier in the day, the Iranian official and Syria's Foreign Minister Walid al-Muallem discussed the latest developments in Syria and the region.

They emphasized the significance of Sochi peace talks, expressing hope that the National Dialogue Congress would push for a peaceful settlement of the Syrian crisis.
