Russian Frigate Tests Strike Capabilities in Atlantic MOSCOW (Reuters) -- The Russian Defense Ministry

said on Wednesday the frigate Admiral Gorshkov tested its strike capabilities in the western Atlantic Ocean. In a statement, the ministry said the frigate had run a computer simulation on hypersonic Zircon missiles. Zircon missiles have a range of 900 km (560 miles), and can

travel at several times the speed of sound, making it difficult to defend against them. The statement did not say the frigate had launched a missile. Tensions between the West and Russia have reached the highest point in years due to the conflict in Ukraine.

Several Sectors of Europe Hit by Strikes

BERLIN (Dispatches) -Several sectors across Europe have been impacted by strikes as workers demand higher pay and better working conditions. Around 300 flights were

cancelled at the Berlin Brandenburg Airport as workers went on strike on Wednesday, the airport said.

Those flights would have transported some 35,000 passengers.

"Affected passengers are asked to contact their airline for information on rebooking and alternative travel options," the airport added in a

Employees in security, ground handling services and the company running the airport were striking over a pay dispute.

The airport opened in 2020 after significant delays and construction problems. Berlin Brandenburg Airport continues to struggle financially with a lot of debt but is working on becoming "financially independent," a spokesman

Workers at an Amazon warehouse in Coventry became the first in the UK to go on strike over the company's low pay.

The workers voted in mid-December to go on strike.

"The fact that they are being forced to go on strike to win a decent rate of pay from one of the world's most valuable companies should be a badge of shame for Amazon," said GMB senior organizer Amanda Gearing in a press release when the vote happened.

A spokesperson for the GMB union said the workers make £10.50 (€11.89) as a base rate per hour but the workers are asking for £15 (roughly €17).

Around 300 workers went on strike on Wednesday at the Amazon warehouse.

Italy's petrol station operators have been on strike across the country since Tuesday evening, although self-service stations remain open.

The action is taking place on both motorways and local

Unions however are divided on how long the strike will last. Some operators will continue throughout Thursday while others will end it on Wednesday.

The main reason for the strike is the obligation for operators to display a panel showing the regional average fuel price. Unions say the government's measure is accusing operators of "speculating on gas prices at the expense of the consumers".

Despite the strike, however, Italian law requires that at least 50% of stations in urban areas remain open. On motorways, there should be at least

one station operating every

100 kilometers.

The leaders of France's eight biggest unions were holding a press conference in Paris over the government's controversial pension reform, which aims to raise the retirement age from 62 to 64.

According to a poll conducted in January by IFOP, the reform is opposed by 68% of French people.

The proposal has already triggered fierce protests in the country, with opposition parties arguing the retirement age should be reduced instead.

Last week, over one million people took to the streets against the planned overhaul. In Paris, police clashed with protesters, with doctors having to amputate the testicle of a young man after he was clubbed in the groin by a police officer.

More Carnage in U.S.: 24 People Dead

WASHINGTON (CNN) -- A series of shootings in three states has made for a heart-wrenching several days, leaving 24 dead as more cities join a growing list of American communities scarred by gun violence.

"Only in America do we see this kind of carnage, this kind of chaos, this kind of disruption of communities and lives and confidence and sense of safety and belonging," California Gov. Gavin Newsom said after his state suffered three mass shootings in about 44 hours.

Forty mass shootings have been recorded in the U.S. so far in 2023 – more than at this point in any year on record, according to the Gun Violence Archive.

Newsom was still visiting victims of Saturday night's Monterey Park shooting that claimed 11 lives when he was told of a second shooting Monday afternoon in Half Moon Bay, which officials later described as an apparent "act of workplace violence" that left seven dead.

"I feared two days ago that Monterey Park would give way to other headlines. Little did I know I'd be up here," Newsom said, speaking from Half Moon

"Meanwhile, the trauma and the damage the devastation is felt for generations in some cases - communities being torn asunder, no one feeling safe."

Hours after the Half Moon Bay shooting, five people were shot, including an 18-year-old who died, Monday in Oakland, Cali-

Also on Monday, a man in Des Moines, Iowa, opened fire at a building that houses an educational program for at-risk youth, killing two students and leaving the program's founder seriously injured, police said.

Then, early Tuesday, a man shot and killed three people at or near a Circle K convenience store in Yakima, Washington, police said.

Those are just some of the communities grieving following recent acts of gun violence, including mass shootings in which four or more people were shot, not including a gunman.

The suspect – identified as Chunli Zhao - killed seven people and injured one in a mass shooting in Half Moon Bay, California Monday, officials said. Four people were shot at a mushroom farm, where the suspect was an employee, and three more were killed at a nearby farm, authorities said.

The Half Moon Bay massacre was an apparent workplace violence case. The suspect had been accused of violence against a coworker in 2013, court records

"All of the evidence we have points to this being the instance of workplace violence," San Mateo County Sheriff Christina Corpus said Tuesday, adding the victims were either Asian or Hispanic.

Zhao was a "coworker or for-

mer coworker" of the victims at each shooting site, the sheriff's

office said. The suspect, who was not known to local law enforcement prior to the shooting, owned a semi-automatic weapon that was registered to him, the sheriff told CNN Tuesday.

The suspect had been accused of trying to suffocate and threatening to kill a former coworker at another job nearly a decade ago, according to court records obtained by CNN, which show he was subject to a temporary restraining order after a former coworker and roommate accused him of attacking and threatening him in 2013.

Authorities still don't know what motivated the Saturday night shooting at Star Ballroom Dance Studio in Monterey Park, which came as the city's majority Asian community was celebrating the Lunar New Year.

Investigators served a search warrant at the home of the suspected gunman - 72-year-old Huu Can Tran - and found "hundreds of rounds" of ammunition as well as evidence leading officials to believe he was "manufacturing homemade firearm suppressors," Los Angeles County Sheriff Robert Luna

The gunman fired 42 rounds from a semi-automatic handgun at the dance hall before heading to a second dance studio in nearby Alhambra, where a civilian (Continued on Page 7)

BERLIN (Dispatches) — After weeks of hesitation that created impatience among Germany's allies, Chancellor Olaf Scholz announced Wednesday that his government would provide Ukraine with Leopard 2 battle tanks and approve requests by other countries to do the

The German government said it would initially provide Ukraine with one company of Leopard 2 A6 tanks, or 14 vehicles. The goal is for Germany and its allies to provide Ukraine with 88 of the German-made Leopards, which comprise two battalions.

"This is the result of intensive consultations, once again, with our allies and international partners," Scholz said in an address to German lawmakers.

"It was right and it is important that we didn't let ourselves be driven (into making the decision)," he added.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky expressed satisfaction at the news. Several European countries have equipped their armies with Leopard 2 tanks, and Germany's announcement means they can give some of their stocks to Ukraine.

It is not clear when or how the tanks would be delivered to Ukraine, or how soon they could have an impact on the battlefield Military analysts have said Russian forces are thought to be preparing for a spring offensive.

Russia's ambassador to Germany, Sergey Nechayev, called Berlin's decision to send Leopard 2 tanks to Ukraine "extremely dangerous."

The move "shifts the conflict to a new level of confrontation and contradicts the statements of German politicians about their reluctance to get involved in it," Nechayev said in a statement.

"We're seeing yet again that Germany, as well as its closest allies, is not interested in a diplomatic resolution of the Ukraine crisis. it is determined to permanently escalate it and to indefinitely pump the Kyiv regime full of new lethal weapons," the statement read.

Scholz had insisted that any decision to provide Ukraine with powerful Leopard 2 tanks would need to be taken in conjunction with Germany's allies, chiefly the United States. By getting Washington to commit some of its own tanks, Berlin hopes to share the risk of any backlash from Russia.

Ekkehard Brose, head of the German military's Federal Academy for Security Policy, said tying the
