Iranian Company Produces Anesthetic Drug Ketamine



TEHRAN (IRNA) – The CEO of Exir Pharmaceutical Company in Iran's Borujerd, Saman Gholami, said that Ketamine - as a dissociative anesthetic used medically for induction and maintenance of anesthesia- was produced and released on the market for the first time in Iran by Exir Pharmaceutical Company.

Gholami said that Ketamine as an anesthetic medicine is used for anesthesia and special care in hospitals, and now the medicine is produced by this company, and presently there is no need to import it anymore.

He added that this medicine

The CEO of Exir Pharmaceutical Company in Iran's Borujerd added that the production line of this drug was launched for the first time in Iran and in the first phase, 20,000 vials of "Ketamine" were produced, and another 20,000 vials were produced and ready to enter the market.



Chinese Autobiography Rendered Into Persian



TEHRAN (IBNA) -- An autobiography book, 'Red Roulette: An Insider's Story of Wealth, Power, Corruption, and Vengeance in Today's China' (2021) by Desmond Shum a well-written account of China today has been published in Persian.

One of the very few insider accounts we have of how things get done at the top in China, the book has been translated into Persian by Bijan Ashtari. Tehran-based Sales Publishing has released 'Red Roulette' in 462 pages.

As Desmond Shum was growing up impoverished in China, he vowed his life would be different. Through hard work and sheer tenacity he earned an American college degree and returned to his native country to establish himself in business. There, he met his future wife, the highly intelligent and equally ambitious Whitney Duan who was determined to make her mark within China's male-dominated society.

Whitney and Desmond formed an effective team and, aided by relationships they formed with top members of China's Communist Party, the so-called red aristocracy, he vaulted into China's billionaire class. Soon they were developing the massive air cargo facility at Beijing International Airport, and they followed that feat with the creation of one of Beijing's premier hotels. They were dazzlingly successful, traveling in private

jets, funding multi-million-dollar buildings and endowments, and purchasing expensive homes, vehicles, and art.

But in 2017, their fates diverged irrevocably when Desmond, while residing overseas with his son, learned that his now ex-wife Whitney had vanished along with three coworkers

This vivid, explosive memoir shows "how the Chinese government keeps business in line—and what happens when businesspeople overstep" (The New York Times) and is a "singular, highly readable insider account of the most secretive of global powers" (The Spectator).

Desmond Shum, who was born in Shanghai and raised in Hong Kong, developed the largest air cargo logistics facility in China, the Beijing Airport Cargo Terminal. He also led the development of the Bulgari Hotel in Beijing. In addition, starting in the early 2000s, he was an early pioneer of philanthropy in China, gifting extensively both domestically and internationally.

Desmond holds a bachelor's degree in finance and accounting from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in the United States, and is a graduate of the joint-EM-BA program of Northwestern University (U.S.) and the Hong Kong University of Science and Technology


Roshd International Festival Starts Work

More Vitamin K Intake, Less Bone Fracture Risk

vitamin K1 can help reduce
the risk of fractures in older
populations -- especially hip
fractures.

In a study by Edith Cowan University's Nutrition and Health Innovation Research Institute, and the University of Western Australia, researchers investigated the relationship between fracture-related hospitalizations and vitamin K1 intake in almost 1400 older Australian women over a 14.5-year period from the Perth Longitudinal Study of Aging Women.

They discovered that women who ate more than 100 micrograms of vitamin K1 consumption -- equivalent to about 125g of dark leafy vegetables, or one-to-two serves of vegetables -- were 31 per cent less likely to have any fracture compared to participants who consumed less than 60 micrograms per day, which is the current vitamin K adequate intake guideline in Australia for women.

There were even more positive results regarding hip fractures, with those who ate

the most vitamin K1 cutting their risk of hospitalization almost in half (49 per cent).

Consumption of between 75-150g vitamin K1 daily, that is equivalent to one to two serves of vegetables such as spinach, kale, broccoli and cabbage, is ideal.
