# **UAE Investment in Indian-Administered** Kashmir 'Complete Betrayal'

DUBAI (Middle East Eye) -News of the Emirati property company Emaar investing in Indian-administered Kashmir has been branded a "complete betrayal" by activists and Kashmiris in the region and abroad.

Many believe Kashmir is set to meet a fate similar to Palestine's, with some Arab and Islamic countries withdrawing their support for the Muslim population's cause in order to build better economic and diplomatic relations with India.

In March, Emaar's chief executive in India revealed plans to build a shopping mall and an office complex in Srinagar, capital of the Indian-administered Jammu and Kashmir region. Amit Jain said that the investment worth \$60m would generate around 7,000 to 8,000 jobs.

Speaking on behalf of the Indian government, Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha said the announcement marked a "historic day" for Kashmir and that "business leaders from the UAE have been invited to invest in J&K and become 'partners'".

The Kashmir region is divided between areas administered by India, Pakistan and China and has been fought over since the partition of India by the British Empire in 1947.

The Indian government stands accused of thousands of human rights violations and extrajudicial killings in the region, with allegations of brutally suppressing a decades-long freedom struggle by Kashmiris.

Kashmiri rights campaigner Ershad Mehmood, executive director at the Centre for Peace, Development and Reforms, based in Islamabad, told Middle East Eye: "I am in absolute shock. This is a complete betrayal of the people of Indianoccupied Kashmir and their struggle.

"They shouldn't have done this. This completely strengthens India's stance, it recognizes Kashmir as Indian territory and completely whitewashes our struggle," he said. "The UAE has just sent a message to the people of Kashmir that it doesn't care about their rights and aspirations."

Another campaigner, Altaf Hussain, who manages the Kashmir Institute of International Relations, said that "the message India is trying to convey to the Kashmiris is that nobody is with you - even the UAE is investing with us. They want to project this as a negative impact on the Kashmiri struggle".

Hussain emphasized that there was no peace in Jammu and Kashmir and that India "has on its hands a long list of human rights violations"

Indian human rights violations in Kashmir have made international investment highly controversial.

Just after Emaar's announcement last month, UN Special Rapporteur Mary Lawlor appealed to the Indian authorities to stop the latest attacks on human rights activists in Jammu and Kashmir.

India is also in violation of UN resolutions on holding an independence plebiscite in the region and the withdrawal of 600,000 Indian soldiers currently based in Jammu and Kashmir.

breadth of topics covered by the documents, but they do not rule out pro-Russian actors. More theories could develop as the investigation progresses, they said.

Ukraine said its president and top security officials met on Friday to discuss ways to prevent leaks.

The White House has declined to discuss publicly who might be responsible for the breach, and has referred all questions about the leak to the Pentagon. The Pentagon said that over the weekend, U.S. officials spoke with allies and had notified the relevant congressional committee about the leak.

"I'm deeply troubled by the possible extent and nature of the information exposed and expect to be fully briefed in the days to come," said Representative Jason Crow, a former Army Ranger who sits on the U.S. House of Representatives intelligence and foreign relations committees.

In a statement on Sunday, Israeli prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office labeled as "mendacious and without any foundation whatsoever" a document asserting that the Mossad, one of the country's intelligence agencies, encouraged recent protests against Netanyahu's plan to tighten controls on the judiciary.

A South Korean presidential official said on Sunday the country was aware of reports about the leaked documents and planned to discuss "issues raised" with Washington.

One of the documents gave details of internal discussions among senior South Korean officials about U.S. pressure on Seoul to supply weapons to Ukraine, and its policy of not doing so. One of the documents marked "Top Secret" purportedly detailed how Russian private military contractors met with Turkish "contacts" to buy weapons from Ankara.

Some of the most sensitive information is purportedly related to Ukraine's military capabilities and shortcomings.

It is not uncommon for the United States and other countries to spy on their allies. But public disclosures of such spying are uncomfortable for those allies, who need to explain to their populations how they will respond.

"It is going to take some time to rebuild trust with our allies," the second U.S. defense official interviewed by Reuters said.

# Gaza UNRWA Staff Strike, Pledge Additional Measures

GAZA (MEMO) - The UN Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA)'s Gaza staff on Sunday carried out a complete strike that paralyzed all institutions, pledging to take additional measures if the agency did not meet their demands.

Health clinics closed, some 50,000 school students did not go to their schools and rubbish piled up in the streets.

The strike was preceded by a

go slow action carried out last month, and this full-day strike was carried out because there had been no progress with UNRWA.

UNRWA claims it has been suffering from a very large budget deficit, the Gaza UNRWA staff union said, due to donation short-

Amir al-Mis-hal, head of UNRWA's Arab employees, stressed that the comprehensive strike is an extension of the industrial action started in November when the staff union proposed a package of demands and were given an assurance that they would be met by the start of this

Mis-hal said that several issues were resolved, including the appointment of 200 teachers this month and 250 more at the beginning of next year.

However, there are many outstanding issues between the staff union and UNRWA's administration, including the contracts of 60 sanitation workers under the age of 60 who have been working for 12 years without rights.

Mis-hal said that UNRWA's High Commissioner has agreed to add \$8 million to the budget, but the current Regional Director has not yet fulfilled the agreement.

The outdoor dining ban only applies to establishments in Herat, where such premises remain open to men. Baz Mohammad Nazir, a deputy official from the Ministry of Vice and Virtue's directorate in Herat, denied media reports that all restaurants were off limits to

It applied only to restaurants with green areas, such as a park, where men and women could meet, he said. "After repeated complaints from scholars and ordinary people, we set limits and closed these restaurants."

He also denied reports that sales of DVDs of foreign films, TV shows and music are banned in the province, saying that business owners were advised against selling this material because it contradicted Islamic values.

Addressing a child during an open dialogue with the residents of the Asmarat district, Sisi said, "I used to walk around and see difficult areas, and I was an ordinary person just like you. If I could reach it, I would do it, and it was a dream, and God

He added, "My dream has not ended, and I hope to see all Egyptians in the best condition," noting that his dream is on the right track if Egyptians are in the best condition.

Sisi continued, "We are working on the first phase of 'Decent Life'; we hope to finish it, and there are two more phases. We are talking about 60 million people whose lives we want to improve," directing his speech to one of the citizens, saying, "Do you know what it means when a person's home has ina family or 100 or 1,000, but millions, as well as drinking water, electricity, and other things we do."

Sisi's words come at a time when Egyptians are caught in a spiral of rising prices and shortages of essential goods due to the significant loss of value in the Egyptian pound. At present, Egypt's economy is under the burden of debt and budget deficit, forcing the state to sell its assets.
