

Lavrov, Amir-Abdollahian Hold Phone Talks

MOSCOW (Dispatches) -- Iranian Foreign Minister Hussein Amir-Abdollahian held a telephone conversation with his Russian counterpart Sergei Lavrov Sunday, during which the two sides stressed the need for an immediate ceasefire in the Gaza Strip, the Russian Foreign Ministry said in a statement. The primary focus of the discussion, initiated from the Iranian side on Sunday, centered around the current situation in the Gaza Strip, it said. The ministers highlighted the need for an immediate ceasefire and delivery of humanitarian aid to the civilians in Gaza. Lavrov and Amirabdollahian also discussed plans for future encounters between Tehran and Moscow, along with other matters related to bilateral relations and international cooperation.

Iranian FM: Palestinian Military Potentials Still Untapped

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Iran Unveils Fattah-II Hypersonic Missile

TEHRAN -- Iran on Sunday unveiled its latest hypersonic missile, named "Fattah II".

Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Seyyed Ali Khamenei oversaw the unveiling during an inspection of the missiles and drones belonging to the aerospace unit of the Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC).

"Fattah II" has been described as a hypersonic missile with glide capability, falling into the HGV hypersonic weapons category.

The announcement follows Iran's introduction of its first domestically-produced hypersonic missile, "Fattah," unveiled in June.

During the event, Ayatollah Khamenei said he enjoyed speaking before commanders and officials of the Ashura University of Aerospace Science and Technology.

The Leader said a "correct assessment of needs" and "concentration on needs in science and research" are the most important aspects of Iran's defense power.

The exhibition included sections on missiles, drones, defense, and space. The new and updated achievements of young scientists and experts from the IRGC Aerospace Force were displayed under the title "All Iranian: From concept to product."

During the visit, the "Mehran" mobile defense system, and the upgraded "9th of Dey" system, as well as the "Shahed 147" drone were also unveiled.

The latest measures taken and developments in the fields of satellite-carrying rockets and sending satellites into space were another part of this exhibition.

Fattah-II is capable of posing a serious challenge to low, medium and high-altitude defense systems.

The "Shahed-147" drone is also a wide-body aircraft with a wingspan of 26 meters. It can fly up to an altitude of 60,000 feet and has a detection range of more than 1,000 km.

In the defense sector, anti-MAV and missile systems with a range of 20 km to 320 km were exhibited.

Leader: Zionist Regime Has Suffered Defeat

TEHRAN -- Leader of the Islamic Revolution Ayatollah Ali Khamenei said Sunday the Zionist regime of Israel has suffered a "defeat" in its war against Palestinian resistance, and that it was "a fact".

Israel's bombing campaign and ground invasion have martyred more than 12,300 people in the narrow Palestinian territory of the Gaza Strip, including more than 5,000 children.

In a speech at an Islamic Revolution

Guard Corps aerospace force centre in the capital Tehran, Ayatollah Khamenei said "the defeat of the Zionist regime in Gaza is a fact."

"Advancing and entering hospitals or people's homes is not a victory, because victory means defeating the other side, which is something that the Zionist regime has not been able to achieve so far, nor will it be able to do so in the future," the Leader said.

The Leader said the occupy-

ing regime "has so far failed" in achieving its declared goal of destroying Hamas "despite the massive bombings" of Gaza.

"Despite the massive bombings in Gaza, the Zionist regime has so far failed in its action because they said from the beginning that their goal is to destroy and cripple Hamas and the Resistance, but after more than 40 days and after using all their military power, they have not yet been able to do this," he said.

"This failure means that the U.S. and Western countries have failed as well, and now the whole world is faced with the realization that a regime that has such comprehensive and advanced military facilities and equipment has not been able to defeat an opponent that does not have any of these facilities."

The savage bombardment of hospitals, women and children in Gaza is a sign that the leaders of the Zionist regime are enraged by their defeat, Ayatollah Khamenei said.

The Leader said the events in Gaza revealed many facts that were hidden from people around the world, one being the support of the heads of Western countries for racial discrimination.

"The Zionists consider themselves as a superior race and they consider the rest of the human race to be inferior. That is why they have killed several thousand children without any remorse."

He said, "When the president of the United States, the chancellor of Germany, the president of France and the prime minister of England support and help such a racist regime with all the things that they claim, it means that these men support racism, which is one the most despised issues in the world."

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Ansarullah Seizes Zionist Ship in Red Sea

SANAA (Dispatches) -- Yemen's armed forces have seized an Israeli ship and detained dozens of its crew members in the Red Sea, Lebanon's Al-Mayadeen television reported on Sunday.

The Yemeni naval forces "succeeded in detaining an Israeli ship in the depths of the Red Sea", it said. Fifty-two people who were on board the ship were arrested, the report said.

The detention came after Yemen's Ansarullah resistance movement warned that it will target any Israeli ship crossing the country's territorial waters.

Al-Mayadeen said the ship's crew and those on board are currently under investigation and their nationalities are being verified by the relevant Yemeni agencies.

Israeli media confirmed the regime's ownership of the confiscated ship. The vessel goes by the name of 'Galaxy Leader.' The media said its entire crew members had been detained

by Yemen's naval forces in the south of the Red Sea.

Brigadier General Yahya Saree, the spokesman for the Yemeni armed forces, announced earlier in the day that the military units would target all ships owned or operated by Israeli companies or carrying the Israeli flag. Yemen's move, he said, is in support of Palestinians amid Israel's savage onslaught on the besieged Gaza Strip.

Saree also called on all countries to withdraw their citizens working as crews on any such vessels.

In a televised speech broadcast live on November 14, the leader of Yemen's Ansarullah resistance movement called on Arab countries and the Muslim world to adopt a clear stance in the face of Israel's atrocities in Gaza.

Abdul-Malik al-Houthi said the Yemeni forces are keeping a watchful eye on any Israeli ship in the Red Sea, and in the Bab el-Mandab Strait in particular, as well as Yemeni territorial wa-

ters.

Houthi said the Israeli occupation "did not dare raise Israeli flags on its ships in the Red Sea."

"They camouflage, which indicates their fear and the effectiveness of our position."

On November 9, Yemeni armed forces launched a batch of ballistic missiles at various sensitive targets lying across the southern part of the occupied territories.

Yemen's Al-Masirah television network reported at the time that the projectiles had hit military targets in the Umm al-Rashrash area in the city of Eilat.

Saree reiterated then that the Yemeni forces would continue to carry out their military operations "until the Israeli aggression against our brothers in Gaza stops."

Days earlier, Yemeni forces had launched a large-scale drone strike against "sensitive" targets in the occupied territories in a show of support for Palestinian people in the Gaza Strip.

CNN: Israel 'Rearranged' Weapons at Shifa Hospital

OCCUPIED AL-QUDS (Dispatches) -- An analysis Saturday by CNN did not exclude the possibility that the Zionist army "rearranged" weapons it claimed to have found at the Al-Shifa Hospital in Gaza City before the international media were allowed to visit the site.

CNN said that according to a Nov. 15 video published by Israeli army spokesperson Jonathan Conricus, an AK-47 gun was seen behind an MRI machine in one of the buildings in the Al-Shifa Hospital complex.

But when Fox News foreign correspondent Trey Yingst visited the site, he filmed two AK-47 guns behind the MRI machine, not one as appeared in the earlier video by the Israeli army.

"It is unclear where the second AK-47 gun came from and why it is not visible in the earlier IDF clip," said CNN.

It noted in its analysis that BBC was also granted access to the MRI room at the hospital and filmed the two AK-47 guns.

The occupying regime of Israel has long accused Hamas of using the Al-Shifa Hospital to direct

military operations -- an allegation vehemently denied by the Palestinian resistance group.

The Gaza-based Health Ministry said dozens of patients, including premature babies, have died at the hospital between Nov. 11-16 due to a lack of electricity as the Israeli army cordoned off the hospital before storming.

On Sunday, 31 "very sick" premature babies were safely transferred from Gaza's main hospital to another in the south on Sunday, and will be moved to Egypt on Monday, health officials said, as scores of other critically wounded patients remained stranded there days after Israeli forces entered the compound.

The fate of the newborns at Shifa Hospital had captured global attention after the release of images showing doctors trying to keep them warm. A power blackout had shut down incubators and other equipment, and food, water and medical supplies ran out as Zionist forces faced stiff resistance from Palestinian fighters outside the hospital.

World Health Organization chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said on social media that the "very sick" babies were evacuated along with six health workers and 10 staff family members. They were taken in ambulances of the Palestinian Red Crescent to a hospital in the southern Gaza city of Rafah, where they were receiving urgent care.

The babies suffered from dehydration, vomiting, hypothermia and some had sepsis because they didn't receive any medication, and they had not been in "suitable conditions for them to stay alive," said Mohamed Zaqout, director of Gaza hospitals. They'll go to Egypt for more specialized care, he said.

A WHO team that visited the hospital on Saturday said 291 patients were still there, including the babies, trauma patients with severely infected wounds, and others with spinal injuries who are unable to move. Four babies died in the two days before their visit, according to Zaqout.

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
