Israel Has Yet to Tell a Single Truth

It has been more than a month since Israel launched its forceful ethnic cleansing campaign in Gaza in response to Operation Al-Agsa Flood initiated by the Palestinian resistance.

Since then, the occupying regime has been repeating its fabrications and misinformation, not only to rationalize its actions in Gaza but also to garner global sympathy, painting itself as a victim while escalating attacks against innocent Palestinians.

Of particular concern are Israel's justifications for targeting hospitals in Gaza, which are serving as shelters for displaced individuals, and its persistent efforts to depict Palestinian resistance fighters as terrorists – a narrative Israel amplified with its claims about all that had unfolded on October 7.

After U.S. President Joe Biden voiced his condemnation of Hamas for invading southern Israel and committing acts, including the alleged beheading of 40 babies, the shockwave through the public was extensive and understandable.

However, it was unfounded. In the aftermath of October 7, first-hand accounts from witnesses provided a different version of events, one which did not shock those who closely follow the Palestine-Israel crisis. Israeli troops, they explained, desperate to contain the surprise incursion, inadvertently fired at their own citizens with heavy weaponry, causing numerous deaths from "friendly fire".

Testimonies compiled by the Grayzone contradict Israel's official account of events, with the occupation entity withholding crucial details about the alleged atrocities committed by Hamas. Unverified claims circulated by Israel, including the gruesome accusation that Hamas beheaded 40 babies, were widely dismissed as propaganda designed to justify collective punishment against Gaza's 2.2 million inhabitants.

This was confirmed by Haaretz's report this weekend of the police investigation which found that a military helicopter that fired at the Palestinian resistance fighters also hit some revelers at the Nova Festival on 7 October.

Izzat al-Rishq, a spokesperson for Hamas, said that the international media had "spread lies about our Palestinian people and the resistance claiming that members of the Palestinian resistance beheaded children and attacked women with no evidence to support such claims and lies."

This was confirmed by Israeli civilian, Yasmin Porat, a survivor of a hostage standoff in Be'eri, who detailed how Israeli Special Forces "undoubtedly" killed hostages including her partner who was gunned down, along with other hostages in the chaotic shooting.

Further testimonies suggest that, in the heat of battle, Israeli troops likely resorted to indiscriminate firing into civilian areas and homes, resulting in an untold number of preventable Israeli deaths.

This indiscriminate approach mirrors Israel's current strategy, 45 days into the relentless air and ground attacks on Gaza. According to Palestinian officials, more than 12,400 Palestinians have been killed, including over 7,800 women and children, and more than 29,200 injured.

Israel's bloodthirsty narrative surrounding the Palestinian resistance took root, giving it the green light to launch a "genocide in making", as UN experts now refer to Gaza.

This incident marks just the beginning of a series of egregious lies disseminated to the public by Israel, as thousands of other false reports circulate daily in the media.

In defiance of international calls for a ceasefire, Israel asserts its commitment to a relentless offensive in Gaza "with full force", demanding the release of over 240 hostages held by Hamas. However, a closer look reveals a stark contradiction in Israel's actions, calling into question its purported concern for the hostages' safety.

The Israeli regime's claim to prioritize the well-being of hostages is challenged by the indiscriminate bombing of Gaza, putting these very lives at grave risk. If the hostages were truly a priority — why endanger them with such aggressive military tactics? Hamas has already said that Israel's bombing campaign has killed some 57 prisoners of war held in Gaza.

For its part, Hamas insists on the release of all Palestinian prisoners, including 160 children held without charge or trial, as a condition for freeing the prisoners of war seized on October 7. However, in response, Israel not only doubled the number of Palestinians in custody to 10,000 but also unlawfully detained 4,000 laborers from Gaza. Nightly arrest campaigns across the occupied West Bank further compound the issue.

Disturbing videos of Israeli soldiers beating, stepping on, abusing and humiliating detained Palestinians who have been blindfolded, stripped either partially or entirely, and have their hands tied behind (Continued on Page 7)

Bombing of Schools, Hospitals in Gaza Intensifies

GAZA STRIP (Dispatches) – The occupying regime of Israel on Monday warned residents of Gaza's largest refugee camp Jabalia and a nearby coastal camp to evacuate, as the military said it was expanding its invasion of additional neighborhoods in the Gaza Strip."

Gaza's health ministry said at least 12 Palestinians were martyred and dozens wounded when Israel fired into a hospital funded by Indonesia encircled by tanks.

Health officials said 700 patients along with staff were under Israeli fire. The Palestinian news agency WAFA said the facility in the northeast Gaza town of Beit Lahia had been hit by artillery rounds. Palestinian health officials said there were frantic efforts to evacuate civilians out of harm's way.

Hospital staff denied there were any armed militants on the prem-

ises. "We had information earlier that tanks were besieging the Indonesian Hospital. Unfortunately..., communications there are almost cut," Nahed Abu Taaema, director of Nasser Hospital in the southern Gaza city of Khan Younis, told Reuters.

"We are very concerned about the fate of our colleagues and the fate of wounded and patients as well as (displaced) people who may have still (been) sheltering there. No ambulances can reach them, and we're afraid the wounded will die."

Indonesia condemned what it called Israel's "attack" on the hospital set up with Indonesian funding in 2016, saying it clearly violated international humanitarian laws, and urged countries close to Israel to get it to stop the violence.

Like all other health facilities in the northern half of Gaza, the Indonesian Hospital has largely ceased operations but is still sheltering patients, staff and displaced residents.

The occupying regime has ordered the total evacuation of the north, but thousands of civilians remain, many sheltering in hospitals. Food, fuel, medicines and drinking water have been running out across the enclave under Israel's six-week-old siege.

In the south, where hundreds of thousands of Gazans who fled the north of the enclave are sheltering, at least 14 Palestinians were martyred in two Israeli strikes on houses in Rafah, according to Gaza health authorities.

Israeli airstrikes further martyred at least 12 Palestinians sheltering in an UNRWA school at the Bureij refugee camp.

Hisham Zaqout, a journalist for Al Jazeera Arabic, said that many

more people have been wounded. Many of the families were looking for food or resting when the airstrike hit.

Israeli forces also bombed the Al-Kuwait school in north Gaza where hundreds of Palestinians were sheltering, according to the general manager of the Ministry of Health and local media.

The school is located in close proximity to the Indonesian Hospital which is currently surrounded by Israeli tanks. Photos shared online showed the school engulfed in flames.

Gaza's government media office on Monday issued a statement saying that the humanitarian situation in the besieged enclave has worsened significantly.

It said shops and markets now have no basic food items, including flour, rice and canned foods. Bakeries have also been bombed by Israel.

There are growing fears that Gaza will be plunged into famine and disease will spread more quickly as the number of displaced people has caused overcrowding.

Cold weather and rain have made the situation unbearable for displaced Palestinians, with most of them unequipped for the winter months.

Witnesses also reported bouts of heavy fighting between Hamas fighters and Zionist forces trying to advance into north Gaza's Jabalia refugee camp, home to 100,000 people.

Repeated Israeli bombardment of Jabalia, an urban extension of Gaza City that grew out of a camp for Palestinian refugees from the 1948 Israeli-Arab war, has martyred scores of civilians, Palestinian medics say.

Zionist Intel Official Floats Ethnic Cleansing of Gaza

— Israel's intelligence ministry has proposed a "worldwide refugee resettlement scheme" as a "solution" to what the occupying regime refers to as its "Gaza problem." Israeli official, Gila Gamliel, proposed the controversial plan in an article published in the Jerusalem Post.

Gamliel rejected bringing the Palestinian Authority back to rule Gaza. She said that it has failed before and would fail again. Instead, Gamliel shockingly proposed what appears to be a program for ethnic cleansing disguised as humanitarianism.

An Israeli victory would be an "opportunity", explained Gamliel, revealing that her office "has been working diligently on how to proceed the day after Hamas has been defeated and annihilated."

A Hamas defeat would not solve the problem as far as the Zionist regime is concerned, Gamliel argued. "We will still have around two million people in Gaza, many of whom voted for Hamas and celebrated the massacre of innocent men, women, and children," Gamliel said. "Gaza is a breeding ground for extremism."

Gamliel ignored the fact that half of Gaza's 2.2 million are children and would not have been born or eligible to vote during the last election held in 2006. Nevertheless, Zionist officials have deployed this line of argument to justify their indiscriminate killing. Of the 15,271 Palestinians martyred by the Israeli military, 6,403 are children.

The proposal by the international community, including the U.S.,

to bring the PA back to Gaza is an "obvious structural flaw," said Gamliel. She went on to claim that the "PA does not have a markedly different ideology from Hamas."

After dismissing the return of the PA, Gamliel proposed her thinly veiled plan for ethnic cleansing under the guise of a voluntary humanitarian relocation scheme. Gamliel disingenuously calls on nations supporting Palestinians to help resettle refugees.

"Some world leaders are already discussing a worldwide refugee resettlement scheme and saying they would welcome Gazans to their countries," Gamliel claimed. "This could be supported by many nations around the world, especially those that claim to be friends of the Palestinians. This is an opportunity for those who

say they support the Palestinian people to show these are not just empty words."

The Zionist official callously suggests redirecting reconstruction funds away from Gaza towards resettlement costs, so Gazans can be transferred abroad. This completely ignores Israel's central role in creating the humanitarian disaster through its crippling almost two-decade-long siege and blockade of the enclave.

"Instead of funneling money to rebuild Gaza or to the failed UNRWA, the international community can assist in the costs of resettlement, helping the people of Gaza build new lives in their new host countries," said Gamliel, referring to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine refugees.
