2025 - a reduced version of its original bid to secure a five-year ban on 27 February, which was rejected in court.

"This is the first major action on Cambridge's campus after the university enacted repressive measures to criminalize protest for Palestine," a student camper, who wished to remain anonymous for security reasons, told Middle East Eye.

"We know that our acts of protest come with risks of further repression and targeting, yet the escalation of genocide demands our action. There are no universities left in Gaza. We will not deterred when our university funds mass murder."

Cambridge University is made up of 31 self-governing colleges which operate autonomously, including in their financial investments. Many of them have faced protests over their investments since the launch of Israel's war on Gaza in October 2023.

On May 20, King's College announced it would divest millions from the arms industry and companies complicit in "the occupation of Ukraine and Palestinian territories," becoming the first

Oxford or Cambridge college to take such measures. "Cambridge for Palestine is here to show the University that we are back," C4P representative said in a statement.

"So long as Cambridge and its colleges remain backers of the Zionist project, we will continue to return and disrupt the University's violence shrouded in so-called normalcy."

Haaretz: Israeli Military Strikes Killed Over 20 Captives in Gaza

WEST BANK (Dispatches) -The Zionist regime's military aggression endangered the lives of at least 54 Israeli captives in Gaza, 20 of whom were killed, according to a Haaretz investigation, Anadolu

The report said that during 601 days of conflict, starting Oct. 7, 2023, the Zionist army's aggression, including airstrikes, led to captives' deaths either directly or "executed by their captors due to military activity close to their whereabouts."

Hamas is yet to comment on the newspaper's claim of killing Is-

Haaretz said that while hundreds of strikes were avoided due to captives proximity concerns, the army does authorize strikes within a "safe distance" of several hun-

"The more strikes there are, the greater the risk," a military source told Haaretz.

Another admitted: "Where there

is no information [about captives], the attack proceeds."

The investigation contradicts official army claims of taking maximum precautions to protect the captives.

The Zionist regime has pursued a devastating invasion in Gaza since the October 2023. It has since killed more than 54,000 Palestinians, destroyed the enclave and created famine-like condi-

Israel estimates that 58 captives

remain in Gaza, including 20 believed to be alive.

Meanwhile, more than 10,000 Palestinians are held in Israeli prisons under harsh conditions, including reports of torture, starvation, and medical neglect, according to rights groups.

The Zionist regime's opposition and families of captives have accused premier Benjamin Netanyahu of prolonging the war to appease his far-right coalition partners and maintain power.

Report: U.S. Mulls Sanctions Against Chile Over Possible Break With Israel

WASHINGTON (Dispatches) - In response to Chile's recall of military attachés from Tel Aviv over the ongoing Gaza genocide, the United States is reportedly considering imposing sanctions against the South American country.

On Tuesday, Chile's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry of Defense jointly announced the withdrawal of the country's air, defense, and military attachés from its embassy in the Israeli-occupied territories.

Chile's President Gabriel Boric is expected to address the issue during his high-profile Cuenta Pública speech on Sunday and raise the possibility of a full diplomatic break from the Zionist regime.

According to a report by Media Line, an American news agency covering West Asia, in retaliation to Chile's decision, Donald Trump's administration is considering an array of sanctions against Santiago.

The punitive measures include canceling Chile's participation in the U.S. Visa Waiver Program, increasing tariffs on Chilean exports, suspending student visa interviews, and even closing the U.S. consulate in Santiago.

Chile is currently the only country in the Southern Cone of South America that is included in the Visa Waiver Program.

The program allows Chilean citizens to travel to the US without a visa for short stays. Ending the program will mark a significant diplomatic setback for both countries.

According to the report, the US is prepared to adopt measures as severe as those taken with Colombia's President Gustavo Petro, who severed ties with the Zionist regime earlier this year.

Boric who has been in office since 2022, has increasingly distanced Chile from the Israeli regime.

His administration delayed the accreditation of the Israeli ambassador in its first year and barred Israeli companies from participating in the 2024 FIDAE aerospace fair (Chile's International Air and Space Fair).

In November 2023, Chile recalled its ambassador from Tel Aviv and left the post unfilled.

Chile's government has criticized the Zionist regime's "disproportionate and indiscriminate" military actions in Gaza and blocking aid to civilians.

The Ministry of Health in Gaza said on Tuesday that at least 4,000 people have been killed in the territory since March 18, after the Israeli regime shattered a 2-month ceasefire deal with Hamas and resumed its genocidal war against the narrow Strip.

Since October 7, 2023, the war has taken a devastating toll of over 54,000 lives and injured 124,000 individuals, with children and women constituting the majority of

Afghanistan Welcomes Upgraded Diplomatic Ties With Pakistan

KABUL (AFP) - Afghanistan has welcomed the decision to upgrade diplomatic relations with Pakistan, where the Taliban government's foreign minister is due to travel in the coming days, his office said on Saturday.

The move signals easing tensions between the neighboring countries, as relations between the Taliban authorities and Pakistan - already rocky - have cooled in recent months, fueled by security concerns and a campaign by Islamabad to expel tens of thousands of Afghans.

Pakistan's top diplomat on Friday said the charge d'affaires stationed in Kabul would be elevated to the rank of ambassador, with Kabul later announcing its representative in Islamabad would also be upgraded.

"This elevation in diplomatic representation between Afghanistan & Pakistan paves the way for enhanced bilateral cooperation in multiple domains," the Afghan foreign ministry said on X.

Kabul's Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi is due to visit Pakistan "in the coming days," ministry spokesman Zia Ahmad Takal said.

Muttaqi met with Pakistani Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar in May in Beijing as part of a trilateral meeting with their Chinese counterpart Wang Yi.

Wang afterwards announced Kabul and Islamabad's intention to exchange ambas-

sadors and expressed Beijing's willingness "to continue to assist with improving Afghanistan-Pakistan ties."

Dar hailed the "positive trajectory" of Pakistan-Afghanistan relations on Friday, saying the upgrading of their representatives would "promote further exchanges between two fraternal countries."

Only a handful of countries – including China – have agreed to host Taliban government ambassadors since their return to power in 2021, with no country yet formally recognizing the administration.

Russia last month said it would also accredit a Taliban government ambassador, days after removing the group's "terrorist" designation.
