US Nuclear Hypocrisy Pushing World to the Edge

The recent move by the roguish US president, Donald Trump, to station nuclear submarines near Russia as part of his threats to force Moscow into an unjust ceasefire in NATO's pushing of Ukraine into a war with its fellow Slavic neighbour, is indeed the height of hypocrisy.

The more, since this is the same criminal who committed the unpardonable act of terrorism in 2020 in assassinating Iran's Hammer of Terrorism, General Qasem Soleimani, and who openly supports the ongoing Zionist genocide in Gaza, had ordered Israel to launch a 12-day war on Iran, and now intimidates the Islamic Republic to forgo its inalienable right to enrich uranium for peaceful purpose.

The US, the world's most dangerously armed nuclear power, whose atomic installations are beyond the inspection of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), and which has the terrorist record of criminally dropping atomic bombs on the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki during World War 2 (during this very month of August in 1945), is trying to prevent the Islamic Republic of Iran from its right to produce peaceful nuclear energy for development.

It is easy for the United States to talk one thing and do another. After all, as the Americans say "hypocrisy is necessary". This means the hypocrites in Washington can pretend to be 'magnificent' in their promises, since it costs nothing to go beyond promise.

Back in 2009, President Barak Obama gave hope to nuclear disarmament activists around the globe. Speaking in the Czech Republic, he affirmed what he claimed "the US commitment to seek the peace and security of a world without nuclear weapons." It was, and remains, the most laudable of objectives.

It is now clear that Obama (like all US presidents) was lying and was never committed to eliminating these terrifying weapons of mass destruction, as it became fully evident in 2015 in Geneva when he forced the one-sided JCPOA upon Iran, without any commitments by Washington to reduce its own vast nuclear arsenal.

It is an undeniable fact that the US regime, which claims to be concerned about Iran's civilian nuclear energy programme, spends billions of dollars on increasing its own massive nuclear weapons stockpile.

The contradiction between what the US regime is demanding of Tehran and the nuclear capabilities it is pursuing is crystal clear.

This US nuclear hypocrisy makes any resolution to have a world free from weapons of mass destruction all the more difficult.

The US annual manufacture of hundreds of new plutonium pits – the fissile heart of a nuclear weapon – directly contradict the US treaty promises to Russia "to negotiate toward general and complete disarmament."

As the rogue Trump bombed Iran's peaceful nuclear sites without caring for possible radiation leaks and orders nuclear submarines to cruise towards Russia with the least concern for a nuclear flare up, the threat of nuclear terrorism and accidental nuclear strikes have become a grave concern.

This is dangerous, and one wrong step the world would be engulfed in flames in view of the fact that the other nuclear-armed powers, especially the illegal Zionist entity called Israel, love chaos and sadistically enjoy human sufferings and catastrophes.

FM Araghchi: Iran-Pakistan Friendship Strategic Investment in Future

TEHRAN – Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi underscored the strategic importance of Iran-Pakistan relations, describing their long-standing friendship as a crucial investment in regional stability and future cooperation.

In an article published on Saturday by Pakistan's The News, Araghchi emphasized that ties between the two neighbors are rooted not only in geography but in shared history, culture, religion, and common strategic interests.

"Our friendship is not merely a relic of the past; it is a strategic investment in the future. In unity, we find strength," he wrote.

Araghchi highlighted recent high-level exchanges, including President Masoud Pezeshkian's visit to Pakistan, following visits by Iran's late President Ebrahim Raisi and Pakistan's Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif. These visits symbolize a

deepening diplomatic alignment aimed at enhancing regional cooperation.

The Iranian minister pointed to a shared 900-kilometer border that serves as both a physical and cultural bridge, fostering trade, spiritual ties, and mutual trust.

Both countries, he said, are anchored by Islamic values of justice, compassion, and solidarity, which inform their stance on regional issues, including firm support for the Palestinian cause and opposition to injustice.

Addressing security concerns, Araghchi stressed the importance of joint efforts to counter terrorism along the border and condemned the Israeli regime's ongoing genocide in Gaza, illegal occupation in Syria and Lebanon, and recent attacks on Iranian soil.

He praised Pakistan's principled condemnation of Israeli and U.S.

aggression against Iran earlier this year, describing it as a demonstration of solidarity and adherence to international law.

The article also highlighted cooperation within multilateral bodies such as the United Nations, Organization of Islamic Cooperation, Shanghai Cooperation Organization, and Economic Cooperation Organization, reflecting shared goals of sovereignty, non-interference, and regional peace.

Araghchi concluded by calling for strengthened economic ties, cultural exchange, and security cooperation, asserting that Iran and Pakistan must rise together as architects of a peaceful and integrated region.

"In cooperation, we find purpose. And in mutual respect, we find the foundation for lasting peace and shared progress," he said.

Female Iranian Academics Condemn UN Inaction in Letter to Guterres

TEHRAN – A group of female Iranian university professors has sent a powerful letter to United Nations Secretary-General António Guterres, condemning the "inhuman and deplorable" humanitarian crisis in Gaza and urging immediate international action to stop Israeli attacks on Palestinian civilians, especially women.

The letter, dated Saturday, criticizes the UN's "passivity and inaction" in the face of what the professors describe as systematic war crimes committed by Israel, with the explicit support of the United States and some Western governments.

They hold the UN leadership, particularly Guterres, responsible for

failing to uphold the UN's mandate to maintain peace and security.

The professors outline the catastrophic impact of Israeli aggression over the past 20 months, citing more than 60,000 Palestinian deaths from aerial bombardments, extensive injuries, attacks on health facilities, schools, and humanitarian organizations such as UNRWA and the Red Crescent.

The letter also highlights the weaponization of essential resources including food, water, and medicine, as well as deliberate targeting of civilians during bread distribution efforts.

Detailing numerous violations of international law, the signatories de-

nounce Israeli breaches of the Geneva Conventions, war crimes, crimes against humanity, and genocide. They call for accountability, demanding the prosecution of Israel's leaders for their role in these atrocities.

Expressing deep solidarity with Palestinian women, mothers, and families enduring immense suffering, the letter calls on the UN and related international institutions to take urgent and decisive action.

Copies were sent to key UN officials, including the High Commissioner for Human Rights and Special Rapporteurs on Palestinian human rights and violence against women.

Embassy in Denmark Denounces West's 'Ridiculous' Accusations

TEHRAN — The Embassy of the Islamic Republic of Iran in Denmark strongly rejected recent Western allegations accusing Iran of extraterritorial interference against dissidents, journalists, and officials, calling the claims "baseless and politically motivated."

In a joint statement Thursday, Albania, Austria, Belgium, Canada, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Spain, Sweden, the UK, and the U.S. accused Iranian intelligence of attempts to "kill, kidnap,

and harass" individuals in Europe and North America. Iran dismissed these accusations as "completely false" and lacking credible evidence.

The embassy emphasized Iran's respect for international law, sovereignty, and non-interference, urging accusers to present verifiable proof instead of speculation.

It highlighted concerns over Western countries harboring terrorist groups targeting Iran, citing Denmark's failure to prosecute members of the Arab Struggle Movement for the Lib-

eration of Ahvaz (ASMLA) involved in the 2018 deadly attack on an Iranian military parade.

The statement also criticized Albania for sheltering the Mujahedin Khalq Organization (MKO) terrorist group, which it described as conducting sabotage and hybrid warfare against Iran with Western support.

Pointing to recent attacks by Jaish al-Adl terrorists that killed Iranian security personnel and civilians, the embassy called on nations to act honestly and consistently against terrorism and reject double standards.

Iran Reaffirms Commitment to Resistance on Haniyeh Assassination Anniversary

TEHRAN – The Islamic Revolution Guards Corps (IRGC) on Saturday commemorated the first anniversary of the assassination of Ismail Haniyeh, head of Hamas' Political Bureau, condemning Israel for the killing and praising the resilience of the Palestinian people amid ongoing Israeli attacks in Gaza.

Haniyeh was assassinated in Tehran on July 31, 2024, while attending the inauguration of Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian. The IRGC described the killing as a "criminal act" and a blatant violation of Iran's sovereignty and international law.

The IRGC statement highlighted 21 months of relentless Israeli aggression, labeling the blockade of Gaza and denial of basic resources such as food, water, and medicine as "a new form of genocide" and a clear violation of human rights.

It called on international organizations to urgently lift the siege, impose sanctions on Israel, and hold Tel Aviv accountable through an international tribunal, comparing the struggle to South Africa's apartheid era.

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UAE, Iran Urge Regional Vigilance Against Israeli Chaos

TEHRAN — Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi warned that the Israeli regime seeks to undermine security in the region, calling on all neighboring countries to remain vigilant against such threats.

Araghchi made the remarks during a phone call with United Arab Emirates Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Sheikh Abdullah bin Zayed Al Nahyan. He described Israel as "addicted to warmongering and lawlessness," emphasizing the need for regional unity.

The two diplomats discussed recent developments, particularly the situation in Palestine, and explored ways to enhance political, economic, and commercial ties between Iran and the UAE. They stressed the importance of

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
