ICC Prosecutor Faces Alarming Threats to Abandon Israeli Crimes Probe

GENEVA (Dispatches) -- An investigative report has exposed a mounting campaign of intimidation targeting British ICC Chief Prosecutor Karim Khan, revealing alarming threats designed to force him to abandon the investigation into the Zionist occupying regime's war crimes in Gaza.

According to a report by Middle East Eye (MEE), Khan was explicitly warned to withdraw arrest warrants against the leaders of the Zionist regime, or face destruction of both himself and the International Criminal Court (ICC). The threat came in May during a meeting at a hotel in The Hague with Nicholas Kaufman, a British-Israeli lawyer linked to the inner circle of Zionist prime minister Benjamin Netan-

Kaufman claimed to be authorized by Netanyahu's legal adviser to offer Khan a way to "climb down the tree," urging him to reclassify the arrest warrants for Netanyahu and former war minister Yoav Gallant—issued over their genocidal crimes in Gaza—as "confidential," and to refrain from seeking further warrants against Zionist ministers Itamar Ben-Gvir and Bezalel Smotrich, notorious for promoting

illegal settlements in the occupied West Bank.

Kaufman warned that failure to comply would lead to the "destruction" of Khan and the ICC itself. Khan and his wife, Shyamala Alagendra, later confirmed the encounter was a clear threat.

This intimidation campaign emerged just weeks before unsubstantiated sexual misconduct allegations against Khan surfaced claims he has firmly denied. Reports indicate these allegations may have been part of a deliberate attempt to discredit him as he

In addition to death threats and baseless accusations, Khan has faced sanctions from the U.S. government since February. The U.S., which aligns with the Zionist regime and rejects ICC jurisdiction, recently escalated pressure by sanctioning four ICC judges involved in the arrest warrants. A senior U.S. official warned that "all options are on the table" if warrants against Netanyahu and Gallant are not dropped.

Borrell: EU Complicit in Gaza Genocide by Israeli Regime

BRUSSELS (Dispatches) --Former European Union foreign policy chief Josep Borrell accused EU leaders of complicity in the Israeli regime's crimes in Gaza by failing to impose sanctions, urging immediate action to uphold international law and human rights.

In an opinion piece for The Guardian, Borrell declared that the Zionist regime's attacks on Gaza amount to genocide, highlighting the widespread killing and starvation of civilians as well as the systematic destruction of infrastructure. He also condemned the daily violations of international law by Zionist forces and settlers in the West Bank and East Jerusalem.

"For all those with ears to hear and eyes to see, there is little doubt that the Zionist occupying regime is committing genocide in Gaza, slaughtering and starving civilians after methodically destroying the territory's infrastructure," he wrote.

Borrell argued that the EU's ongoing inaction despite its legal obligations under the EU-Israel Association Agreement renders it complicit in the crisis.

"The EU has many levers it could pull to exert significant pressure on the Zionist occupying regime," he said, noting that the bloc is Israel's largest trading partner and participates in several joint funding and exchange programs, including Horizon and Erasmus.

He emphasized that Article 2 of the agreement makes cooperation conditional on respect for human rights, meaning EU leaders have a legal duty to suspend the deal, warning: "Failure to do so would also constitute a serious violation of the association agreement with Israel."

Borrell, who served as the EU's high representative for foreign affairs and security policy until 2024, said he had pushed for stronger measures

during his tenure but received little support from member

"This inaction has already severely damaged the EU's geopolitical standing, not only in the Muslim world but globally,' he said.

"The leaders of the EU and its member states will likely be held accountable in the future for their complicity in the crimes against humanity committed by Netanyahu's Zionist government," he wrote.

"The EU must finally decide to sanction the Zionist occupying regime without further delay," he said.

Agatha Christie's Baghdad Home in Danger of Collapse

BAGHDAD (Dispatches) -- The historic house along the banks of the Tigris River in Baghdad, where legendary British crime novelist Agatha Christie lived for over a decade, stands today as a symbol of rich cultural heritage — yet it is dangerously dete-

Located in the Karadat Maryam district, the vintage home now bears a stark warning sign: "Caution! Danger of collapse." Despite its fragile state, the house continues to hold memories of Christie's time in Iraq and remains a testament to the city's deep historical roots.

Iraqi historian Adil Ardavi confirmed that Christie lived in Iraq for approximately 13 years during the early 20th century. "Many artifacts discovered by her husband, an ex-

pert in historical antiquities, are now preserved in museums," Ardavi noted. He added that Christie, known for her adventurous spirit, frequently traveled across neighboring countries from her base in Iraq.

When choosing her Baghdad residence, Christie selected a house that epitomized traditional Baghdad architecture and offered a scenic view of the Tigris River, which likely inspired parts of her celebrated works. According to local lore, the house was once home to Ali, the brother of Iraq's King Faisal I.

Christie's connections to Iraq ran deep. Her famous novel Murder on the Orient Express includes scenes set in Baghdad a city that once served as a vital stop on the historic train route linking Türkiye and

Europe. Ardavi emphasized Christie's affection for the Iraqi people, stating that her long residence in Baghdad fostered strong friendships within the local community.

Though the home now lies in ruins, there is hope for its restoration. Ardavi suggested that collaboration between the British Embassy in Baghdad and Iraqi authorities could transform the site into a museum honoring Christie's legacy.

Hamza Ebu Sali, a bookseller from Baghdad's renowned Mutanabbi Street-famous for its concentration of used bookstores—highlighted Christie's lasting popularity in Iraq. "Iraqis have a great appreciation for her novels; her books consistently rank among the most soughtafter," he said.
